Council News. The regular meeting of the city council Monday evening was well attended. The engineer on the water system made a report. The sidewalk ordinance came up for its third reading. A delegation of property owners and taxpayers on First avenue appeared to protest against the sweeping sidewalk ordinance. After a lengthy discussion the ordinance passed by a unanimous vote of the five present. The balance of the meeting was taken up with details relating to the water system and the proposed railroad crossing and approaches on Williams avenue. The mayor was instructed to hire a temporary marshal to enforce his regulations. Next an ordinance was ordered drafted regulating the tubercular testing of all milk cows within the city limits and any from outside furnishing milk in the city. A proposal was considered to put in a water main south to the line of Jackson crossing a distance of about two miles, the same to be financed one-third by the users and two-thirds by the city of Scappoose.
