

FLAGG PREDICTS NORBLAD'S NOMINATION

That editor E. H. Flagg of the Warrenton News is certain of Senator Norblad securing the nomination for congress to succeed W. C. Hawley is indicated in the following emphatic editorial which appeared in the last issue of the Warrenton News:

COLUMBIA COUNTY TRACK MEET

Columbia county track and field meet will be held at Rainier on May 6th in the morning starting at ten o'clock. All the high schools in the county are going to send representatives to compete.

In the following events, first will receive 5 points, second will receive 3 points, and third will receive 1 point. The events are as follows: 100-yard dash, 220-yard dash, 440-yard run, 880-yard run, mile run, high hurdles, 220 low hurdles, and relay in the track events. In the field events, 10-lb. shot, discus, high jump, broad jump and pole vault. In each event a blue, red and white ribbon will be given, except the relay race. The meet will be held under the auspices of the Columbia County Athletic association.

In the afternoon of the same day the championship game of baseball will be played between the winners of the Scappoose-St. Helens and Rainier-Clatskanie games at Rainier.

THE ROMANCE OF WORDS

Though every school child knows that Mississippi means "The Father of Waters," the fact that the word was originally spelled "Meche Sepe" is apparent only from a study of the Indian source. And even this is only an approximation of the way the phrase should be written, for the Algonquins had no written language which could be transplanted literally into English letters.

The first form in which we find the name of the river is "Meche Sepe," suggested by Tonti and slight-

ly closer to the present spelling. Father Laval still further modernized it into Michipi, which another priest, Father Labatt, softened into Missipi. Since then, the only changes have been to overload the word with consonants. Marquette added the first "s" and some other explorer the second, making it "Mississippi"—the form in which it is used in France to this day, with only one "p." The man who added the other has never been discovered, but he must have been an American for, at the time of Louisiana Purchase, the name was generally spelled in the colony with a single "p."

HERE ARE SOME OF THE THINGS I WILL DO

- 1. I will vote against every measure which will increase taxes in Oregon, unless it be a measure providing money for the running expenses of government. I will vote for every measure which will decrease taxes in Oregon.
2. I will favor a bill reducing the salary of state officials and of the heads of our educational institutions, some of which are drawing \$10,000 a year.
3. I will oppose the education of doctors and lawyers at the expense of the state.
4. I will oppose any further bond issues in Oregon.
5. I will favor the abolition of every state commission which I deem unnecessary.
6. I will favor the taxation of all bonds and securities held in Oregon. I am opposed to tax-exempt securities.
7. I will favor any measure that will bring about equal assessment and equal taxation.
8. I HOLD THAT THE TAX QUESTION IS THE GREATEST ISSUE IN OREGON AND THAT THIS STATE CAN MAKE NO PROGRESS UNTIL THE TAX BURDEN IS LIFTED FROM THE PEOPLE. When this is accomplished then we may think of new legislation.

I was one of the first three editors in Oregon to come out in opposition in taxing the people for the 1925 Fair. For over 25 years I have opposed the advancing wave of high taxes, which is now engulfing the people.

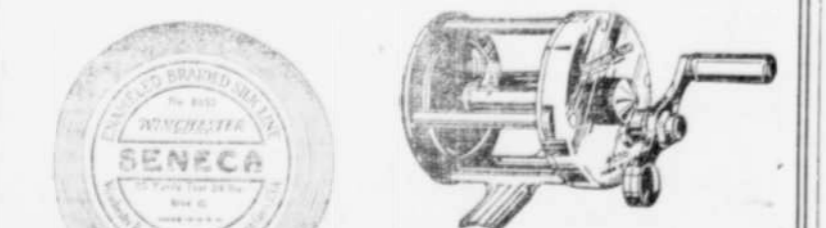
