COUNTY AGENT NEWS

High Producing Cows.
Seventy-seven hundred and forty-four pounds of milk containing 337.75 pounds of butter fat is the average yield of the 1941 cows in the Tillamook cow testing association for the year ending March 1, 1922, according to E. B. Pitts, dairy extension specialist at the college, in a recent report.

Eleven hundred thirty-seven cows were in the association at the beginning of the year, but 95 were weeded out as unprofitable.

The highest producing cow was "Janice," owned at the Cottonwood Farm registered Guernsey, her yield being 841.18 pounds of butter-fat. The second highest yield was 761.38 pounds of fat made by "Jollie," a registered Holstein owned by Neilson brothers.

The highest producing grade cows were "Lady," a Jersey owned by Clyde Kinneman, with a yield of 642.92 pounds of fat, and "No. 3," also a Jersey and owned by Frank Hedger. This animal gave 637.99 pounds of fat.

Thirty-seven cows in the association gave more than 500 pounds of fat.

The average yield of butter-fat for all cows in the state as shown by the census is 258 pounds. The average of the cows in the Tillamook association exceeds this amount by 159.75 pounds. At 40 cents per pound this amounts to \$67.90 per cow and to \$70,852.90 for the 1941 cows completing the association year. This gain to the dairymen comes to them through following association methods in breeding, feeding and in herd handling.

The Tillamook association has been in operation for 13 years. It has just completed its organization for its fourteenth year and more than 2300 cows will be tested. Paul Fitzpatrick is secretary of the association and Peters and Hall testers.
