Spray Recommendations.

Calyx spray will soon be due, just as the last petals are falling and before calyx closes on the main bud of each cluster. This spray is necessary for scab control and represents our first codling moth application. For scab on apples or pears use lime-sulfur, 1 to 40. For codling moth (apples only) add arsenate of lead, 2 gallons to 100 of water. It is noted that there is quite a wide variation in blooming as between different sections and also between different varieties. For this reason no recommendation can be made that will absolutely fit all conditions, but as the calyx spray is one of our most important sprays, we should water closely and apply this just as the last petals are falling.

Considerable complaint is being made over the country against the garden slug, which is doing considerable injury to truck crops. There are several ways of handling the slug. A Bordeaux mixture of 4-4-40 which sprayed on the foliage of the plant proves an excellent repellent, and it is quite possible that the Bordeaux applied in powdered form is better yet. Another method is to use poison bait in combination with the spray. Use calcium arsenate, 1 ounce, to 1 pound of any kind of chopped green material, lettuce leaves preferably. Mix the calcium arsenate with the chopped green material and scatter in small heaps about the area to be protected. Another method is to place salt on the ground where the slugs have to crawl over it in order to reach the plants. The poison method where calcium arsenate is used is probably the most effective. The time is now at hand when we can look for aphids or plant lice to begin to attack our garden and truck crops. Nicotine spray gives the best control against these insects—"Black Leaf 40" applied at the rate of 3-4 pints to each 100 gallons of water, with 4 pounds of soap added, the soap to be dissolved before being added to the spray.

Guernsey Sale.

On Monday, June 5th there will be a consignment sale of Guernsey cattle at the International Livestock Exposition buildings, Portland. Anyone interested in securing good Guernsey females should attend this sale. If you wish to buy and have any idea of what you want, and cannot go yourself, get in touch with the county agent and commission him to make purchase for you. Over 50 Guernseys, the pick of the best herds in the West, will be offered, and it will be a splendid opportunity to secure some of this stock.

Good Cultivation Necessary.

Dry weather for a few weeks has made it almost impossible, because of shortage of teams or tractors, for some orchardists to get their first cultivating done before the ground hardened. As a result, more care must be taken with later cultivation. Break down the clods well and keep up a good ry mulch. The man who has had the foresight to grow cover crops is having less trouble from his soil baking than the man whose soils lack organic matter.

Poultry Manure Rich.

Poultry manure analyzes high in nitrogen, the most expensive of the plant foods to buy as fertilizer, but this element escapes easily by fermentation. To prevent this loss add a small amount of super-phosphate to the manure, which will also reinforce it in phosphorus. Never add ashes to poultry manure as they hasten fermentation which results in the loss of nitrogen as ammonia.

Mallet Kills Crown Borers.

Where crown borers have been serious in loganberries and blackberries, growers may effect some considerable control over next year's pests by breaking off the old cane stubs with a light mallet. This may be done while cultivating. The nature grubs are now in these old stubs but will later develop into moths and escape.

No Representatives Here.

Some persons in the Northwest are being misled into believing that the potato association of America has representatives selling seed potatoes in Oregon. The association officials indicate that they have no division in the northwest and no lots of potatoes to sell.
