Congressman Hawley had several surveys authorized in river and harbor bills for the improvement of the channel at St. Helens, but on all these unfavorable reports were made by the engineers until after their visit in 1920, since when they have made favorable reports on the Willamette Slough project which it is understood will solve the difficulty at St. Helens. This project is included in the pending river and harbor bill and will undoubtedly pass. He has done all that has been possible to do, and will continue to work for its improvement.

Mr. Hawley was specially selected as one of the framers of the Federal Farm Loan Act which is proving so beneficial, and was a member of the committee that framed the agricultural extension act; he was also one who secured the passage of the good roads legislation by Congress with large federal appropriations. Good acts are continuing legislation and will benefit the people of Columbia county every year, and in these benefits the people of Columbia county have already participated as well as in those of many other acts and appropriations in which some or all of the people of the county are interested. He has aided a great many individuals who had claims for relief, such as Mrs. Little Askell of Mayger, whose husband, a fisherman, was run down by a government tug, for whom he secured the passage of a bill giving her a compensation of \$5,000; obtained better postal facilities, and rendered many other services for individuals and localities.

His unusual committee appointments in congress were made by special assignments for fitness, capacity and ability, and he has been entrusted with the preparation of some of the most important legislation ever passed by congress. HERE ARE SOME OF THE THINGS I WILL DO

- 1. I will vote against every measure which will increase taxes in Oregon, unless it be a measure providing money for the running expenses of government. I will vote for every measure which will decrease taxes in Oregon.
2. I will favor a bill reducing the salary of state officials and of the heads of our educational institutions, some of which are drawing \$10,000 a year.
3. I will oppose the education of doctors and lawyers at the expense of the state.
4. I will oppose any further bond issues in Oregon.
5. I will favor the abolition of every state commission which I deem unnecessary.
6. I will favor the taxation of all bonds and securities held in Oregon. I am opposed to tax-exempt securities.
7. I will favor any measure that will bring about equal assessment and equal taxation.
8. I HOLD THAT THE TAX QUESTION IS THE GREATEST ISSUE IN OREGON AND THAT THIS STATE CAN MAKE NO PROGRESS UNTIL THE TAX BURDEN IS LIFTED FROM THE PEOPLE. When this is accomplished then we may think of new legislation.

I was one of the first three editors in Oregon to come out in opposition to taxing the people for the 1925 Fair. For over 25 years I have opposed the advancing wave of high taxes, which is now engulfing the people.
