

## Jubilee Singers Coming to Chautauqua

An Organization of Seven Colored Artists to Croon the Lullabies and Sing the Songs of the Southland in Two Concerts the Closing Day of Chautauqua



Jubilee companies as a rule are limited in musical scope to a lively rendition of the old-fashioned melodies and songs of the Southland. The Garner Jubilee Company and male quartet, however, is a very decided exception to this general rule.

Here is a splendid organization which renders the old plantation favorites, the spirituals and the old folk songs of the South with all the exquisite beauty and the expression so characteristic of the singing of their people. #### MEMORIAL DAY AT VERNONIA

VERNONIA, Ore., June 3.—(Special to The Mist.)—Memorial Day was observed in a fitting manner at Vernonia by John Bucher Post and the Relief Corps.

Post, corps and school children met at the grange hall at 10 a. m. and marched to the bridge spanning Rock Creek and held the service for our sailor dead. During the service flowers were strewn on the water for the boys losing their lives at sea. Flowers and small balloons were also tossed in the air in memory of the boys who were lost during the world war in the air service.

From the bridge all marched to the cemetery where a fitting service was held around the graves of the comrades and also of the world war veterans who died in France. The service at the cemetery was closed by the quartet of Civil War Veterans singing, "Lead Kindly Light."

All returned to town where a picnic dinner was served. The members of the Relief Corps served dinner for the Civil War veterans.

At 2 p. m. the afternoon program began. A quartet composed of Comrades Hamilton, Chambers and Hall and Mrs. Hamilton sang in place of the fourth comrade who was too feeble to make the trip, came from Portland. They sang several beautiful songs and the comrades gave talks which were enjoyed by all. It was estimated that about 250 people attended the afternoon program.

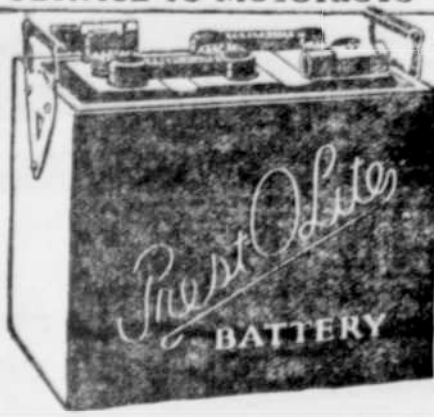
