\$500,000 BOOM

GROUNDS READY

At an outlay of about \$500,000 the Nehalem boom company has provided on the Willamette slough modern booming facilities of large capacity and will be ready to operate July 1. It will be a common user boom for all loggers and open the way for more extensive development of the forest resources northwest of this city. It affords a basis for the rumor that the Central Coal & Coke company of Kansas City, which a few months ago acquired the Eccles' holdings in the Oregon-American Lumber company, intends to proceed with the construction of an export dock adjacent to the Nehalem Boom company's terminal activities for the handling of lumber to overseas markets.

The building grounds are situated at Burlington, within two miles of the city limits of Portland. The site is served by the United Railways line, a subsidiary of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway system, which has repurchased from the Eccles interests all property including improvements and boomage facilities which had been acquired by the lumber operators. The Gales Creek & Wilson River and the Astoria, Portland & Pacific lines, recently purchased by the Great Northern and Northern Pacific, will be the railways over which the timber destined to the Nehalem Boom company's site will be routed to a connection with the United Railway line.

According to W. F. Turner, president of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle system, the controlling factor, the Nehalem Boom Company now owns and has lease upon six miles of water frontage on both sides of Willamette slough, providing accommodations for 50,000,000 feet of logs at one time. Logs from the Nehalem and Wilson river districts will be stored at the booming grounds for sorting, rafting and distribution to sawmills in Portland and at adjacent points along the river.

SALMON RUN IS ON INCREASE

The run of salmon is better since the river is falling, according to reports of the fishermen. The run, is largely "blueback" salmon, which is small in size but of excellent quality. During the week fishermen have delivered several tons of fish to the local buyers, and the boats averaged 150 to 200 pounds. The price, so it is stated, ranges from 12c to 14c per pound. During the high water few fishermen have been out on the river but now that the water is falling and the run of fish increasing it is expected that more boats will be out and the catch will be larger than for the past several weeks.

SHIPPING NOTES OF ST. HELENS PORT

Several Cargoes for California—Japanese Steamer Loading for the Orient.

Lumber shipments for the week will be approximately 2,500,000 feet. The Ollio sailed Saturday night with 900,000 feet of lumber and carrying a number of passengers. The Multnomah got away Monday night laden with a mixed cargo of lumber and piling for delivery at San Francisco and the Wapama loaded a full cargo of 975,000 feet of lumber and sailed Wednesday night. The steamer Shasta, after taking on 175,000 feet of lumber, went down river to complete the cargo.

The Japanese steamer Kalkyu Maru arrived Tuesday and is loading cargo for Kobe and Yokohama. The steamer will take about 800,000 feet and will finish loading Saturday.

The coasters Willamette, Daisy Matthews and Viking are due to arrive the early part of next week and will load cargoes for Southern California ports.
