

ST. HELENS DEFEATS FAST ARLETA TEAM

Team Which Walloped St. Helens in Opening Game of Season Defeated by Locals by Score of 11-6; Mammeyer Pitches Well.

The fast Arleta team of Portland came to St. Helens Sunday with the hope of repeating the victory they registered over Manager Hunt's pots in the opening game of the season when they defeated the home town team by a score of 6 to 5. But this time it was different, for St. Helens came out at the long end of a 11 to 6 score.

Arleta scored two in the second game when, with two on the paths "Rube" heaved a well placed bunt far beyond Calhoun who covers the right field. St. Helens retaliated by chalking up three scores in their half of the inning. Everett Howe made a clean hit and went to third on Reiten's double and Reiten was out when he attempted to come home on Mickey's infield hit. Phil advanced Mickey and he crossed the rubber when the next batter hit to the outfield.

Arleta scored two in the third game when "Rube" couldn't field their bunts and he made two overthrows and the home team seemed demoralized. The visitors added another tally in the fifth on a walk, a stolen base and a hit. The locals annexed a tally in the fourth and repeated the performance in the fifth and put the game on ice in the sixth when they chased four tallies across the home plate. After Paulsen had been given transportation to first, Calhoun singled and the fleet-footed second baseman scored when the ball got away from the right fielder. Howe was safe at first when Arleta's shortstop made an error and Mickey McDonald who now bats from the left side, drove a long single to center scoring two runners. Two other hits chased runners across the home plate and the score was 9-5 in favor of the locals when the inning ended.

Arleta made one tally in the 8th inning. After the first man up went out to Calhoun, unassisted, Fayon tripled down the first base line and scored when Rathjen singled. St. Helens counted two in their half of this inning. After Howe was out on an infield tap, Reiten hit through the pitcher's box. McDonald forced Reiten at second. Phil was safe on an error and when the big "Rube" lifted one into the right garden both McDonald and Phil scored, making the tally 11-6.

Arleta could do nothing in their half of the ninth. The first man to face "Rube" was out when Calhoun took his grounder and beat the runner to first base. The next batter took three healthy swings and retired to the bench. "Rube" got a little generous and issued transportation to the next batter, but tightened up and whiffed the third one. The game was over when Calhoun grabbed a hot grounder and beat the runner to first.

McDonald came through with three hits, two of which were timely and brought in several scores. Mickey is batting from the port side.

Mammeyer has a habit of getting himself in the hole as he invariably walks the first man up. He was liberal with passes issuing transportation to 8, but striking out 9. He poled out a two-base hit with two ahead, scoring them, so we'll say "Rube" is o. k.

Shortstop Phil, in addition to fielding his position well, uses his head after he gets the ball. Very seldom does he have an attack of ivoryitis and his pegs to first go like a bullet.

Danny Paulsen forgot to cover first when Cal ran in for a bunt. Howe beat Cal to it and fired the ball to first, but no one was there and the runner was resting on second before the ball was recovered. Oftentimes a game is lost by some player suffering with a lapse of memory or won by some player who uses his head. There are several "old timers" on the St. Helens club who should give coaching practice on head work.

Parkinson in addition to being a good fielder, is some coacher. He has a line of original stuff that puts pep in the home team and has the opposite effect on the visiting team.
