## RUN OF FISH

### CONTINUES GOOD

During the past week there has been a slight improvement in the run of fish and boats are averaging from 150 to 225 pounds per day so E. I. Ballagh, local manager of the C. R. P. A states. There has been a noticeable improvement in the run of salmon, the quality is good and the average weight is from 15 to 18 pounds. The run of blue-backs continues and there is also quite a number of sturgeon and shad being taken. According to Pete Hansen, who has the reputation of being a No. 1 fisherman, the blue-backs follow the shore line, or get as close to the banks of the stream as they can and when fishing for them he uses a diver net and fishes close in and not as deep as when fishing for salmon. Thursday morning he delivered his catch of 228 pounds of which 172 pounds were blue-backs. The price being paid varies somewhat but averages 12½ to 14 cents per pound. The river is dropping rapidly and fishermen expect the run of fish to continue and improve, reports for the lower river indicating such.
