

ARTICLES MIXED SAYS CORVALLIS EDITOR

In last week's issue of The Mist there appeared an editorial from the Corvallis Gazette-Times, written by the editor of that paper, C. E. Ingalls. The editorial was in reference to the "K. C. Oath" and at the tail end of the editorial, the school bill editorial was mixed up with the "K. C. Oath" editorial. Ingalls says in the following letter to The Mist: Corvallis, Oregon, July 1, 1922. Dear Morton: Just finished looking over the Mist. You must have wondered what in thunder happened to the tail end of my editorial. I didn't know anything had happened until I saw The Mist. The editorial was picked out of the daily and run in the weekly and in the makeup, the boys got another editorial entirely as a wind-up. I am sending you the bottom of the article as it should be so you and your readers will not think me completely crazy.

The "tail end" of the editorial, as stated, abruptly jumped from a consideration of the K. C. oath to the school question. Ingalls was telling of the finding of the committee of Grand Masters of the Masonic lodge in California, and in part, it was this:

"We find that neither the alleged oath nor any oath or pledge bearing the remotest resemblance thereto in matter, manner, spirit or purpose is used or forms any part of the ceremonies of any degree of the Knights of Columbus. The alleged oath is scurrilous, wicked and libelous and must be the invention of a wicked, impious and venomous mind. We find the order of the Knights of Columbus is dedicated to the Catholic religion, to charity and to patriotism."

Those who care to look this up can find it in the Congressional Record, a speech by Representative Kettner of California delivered in the house of representatives January 29, 1915. No wonder the Grand Lodge of California denounced the Klan and forbid Masons from joining it. No wonder the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts has done the same thing.

This paper has no interest in the matter other than to publish the facts in the hope that such publication may do something to alleviate the religious bigotry that exists, most of which is due to lack of information and to trouble makers who stir up animosities for profit. The Klan lecturer points out that the Masons charge an initiation fee. They do, but they don't send out solicitors on a commission at so much per head. We do not question the sincerity of thousands of members of the K. K. K. We know some of them and know that they are exemplary citizens whose patriotism and integrity cannot be questioned. This we stated in this column on several occasions long before the "International Lecturer" came here to sell his wares. We think they have gone into the order under a misapprehension of the facts and that as soon as they find out what the facts are they will do what the Klan did in Ventura—they will disband.
