DAIRY WORK HELPS MANY ON THE FARM

More than fifty dairymen in territory not covered by cow-testing associations are for the first time keeping records of milk production in their dairy herds.

A Thousand Farmers Reached This systematic dairy project work is under way in nearly fifty dairy communities in sixteen counties in the state.

The experience of the Tillamook Cow Testing association has demonstrated that it is possible to increase materially the average production of butter fat per cow by giving attention to good feeding practices and the adoption of good practices in herd management.
