DAIRY WORK HELPS MANY ON THE FARM

More than fifty dairymen in territory not covered by cow-testing associations are for the first time keeping records of milk production in their dairy herds. Several bred-for-production bulls have been purchased and extensive changes in the feeding practices have been put under way. Thus can be summarized some of the known results coming from the first series of meetings held by Extension Dairy Specialist E. H. Fitts and his co-worker N. C. Jamison, as a part of their year around extension dairy program.

A Thousand Farmers Reached

This systematic dairy project work is under way in nearly fifty dairy communities in sixteen counties in the state. During the last few months forty-seven meetings were held at which problems of feeding were discussed by Professor Fitts and Mr. Jamison. The attendance at these meetings was 1529. Approximately a thousand different dairy farmers are being reached directly through this work and the interest is growing. The experience of the Tillamook Cow Testing association has demonstrated that it is possible to increase materially the average production of butter fat per cow by giving attention to good feeding practices and the adoption of good practices in herd management, including particularly the use of pure-bred bulls of known producing ability.
