

JERSEY BREEDERS HOLD MEETINGS

Gatherings are Scheduled for Many Counties from July 17 to August 2—Programs Being Planned.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis.—A series of field meetings for Jersey cattle breeders and others interested will be held throughout the state from July 17 to August 2, for which the programs will be prepared by the American Jersey Cattle club and the several county clubs.

“Oregon Jerseys are attracting world-wide attention because of exceptionally high milk and butter fat records,” says E. B. Fitts, extension dairy specialist, who, with N. C. Jamison, will represent the college at these meetings.

“Recognition of the superiority of Oregon Jerseys has resulted in many calls for breeding stock from other states,” continued Mr. Fitts. “Two carloads of Oregon bred Jersey bulls were recently purchased for California breeders.”

Ivan Loughary, secretary of the Oregon Jersey Cattle club, announces the following schedule: July 7, Multnomah county at K. Hanneman farm, Corbett; July 18, Columbia at Harry West farm, Scappoose; July 19, Clackamas at Oregon City; July 20, Lane at A. O. Thompson farm, Blachly; July 22, Tillamook at Tillamook in evening; July 24, Polk at Independence theatre in evening; July 25, Marion—visits to dairy farms and evening meeting at Commercial club at Salem; July 26, Linn county evening meeting at Albany; July 29, Lincoln at Toledo; July 31, Coos county; August 2, Jackson at library, Medford, in evening.

CROP REPORT FOR COLUMBIA COUNTY

The traffic department of the S. P. & S. Railway company have just issued their crop report for the month ending June 19. The report states that crops of all kinds have suffered from the drought but the cloudy weather west of the mountains and the very slight precipitation was of some benefit.

For Columbia county localities the report gives the following:

St. Helens. Hay was only a fair crop in Columbia county, lack of late June rains made it later than usual; conditions for harvesting good. The wheat is in fairly good shape; oats all right; corn fine; potatoes will be a poor crop without rain so far as early seeding is concerned. Small fruits and berries were of exceptional quality and yield.

Rainier. Perfect weather for haying. Small fruits coming to canneries rapidly. This territory bids fair to be one of the best small fruit sections in the state, climate being ideal for all varieties of berries, large acreage being planted in loganberries. This district in need of rain.

Clatskanie. Fall wheat in fair condition. Grain for silage looking well considering the extreme dry weather. Strawberry crop was very fair, on irrigated lands was good; raspberries in poor condition; large fruits look well to date. Fifty or sixty acres of beans grown in this vicinity, as well as corn, on dyke lands in good shape.

WATCH OUT FOR FIRES; CAMPERS SHOULD HEED

COUNTY AGENT NEWS By F. C. HOLIBAUGH

Berry Cultivation is Important.

Some growers of such brambles as blackcaps, loganberries, raspberries, and blackberries, are under the impression that when the crops have been harvested, little cultivation is necessary for the balance of the season. Such men are cautioned, especially this year, to continue thorough cultivation throughout the month of August to insure good growth of new vines. Should the moisture supply on the soil be excellent and the growth of the vines up to normal, cultivation may be brought to a close by August 10 to 15. Careful cultivation should be supplemented by early pruning in order to remove all old canes from the patch and to allow all moisture and plant food to go into the production of desirable young canes.

Don't Burn Straw Stacks.

As the threshing season approaches farmers in the Willamette valley should bear in mind that the burning of straw stacks means a loss of both nitrogen and organic matter to the soils. A ton of mixed straw contains practically the same amount of plant food that a ton of barnyard manure contains. This material of course, is not as readily available as the plant food in the manure but on the heavy soils gives good results.

Apply Lime After Plowing.

stone on acid soils. Where clover is sown best to use of ground limestone on acid soils. Where clover is to be seeded on winter grain next spring, therefore, the lime will need to be applied this fall after the plowing and ahead of the grain seeding. Farmers contemplating using lime should arrange so they get their supply early enough for face application.
