**RAPID DEVELOPMENT EVIDENT IN PALESTINE**

Jerusalem.—The industrial development of Palestine under the Jews is moving forward in leaps and bounds, and this in spite of the many trade quarrels that have sprung up of late between employer and employee.

During the past year no less than 4000 licenses were issued for new trades and industries in Palestine. The extent of this development can be judged from the fact that prior to 1921 only 2500 licenses were registered by the government. This means that nearly two-thirds of the enterprises in Palestine were started within the last year.

The capital invested in each of these new ventures range from \$20,000 to \$50,000, but with such notable exceptions as the Cilicite company, of Jaffa, with a capital of \$500,000, and the Standard Oil company, now exploiting the Dead Sea basin.

A tract of 500 acres of land has been bought by British Jewish interests and will be devoted to home and factory building, while American interests are starting a building and loan association and a saving bank. A casino, two bathing establishments and electric lights are among the attractions of an "American" seaside resort which has sprung up on the sands stretching to the north of Jaffa.

In reality this is a Jewish township and its local name is Tel Aviv, but to a visitor it appears a go-ahead American town with a spirit that overcomes all obstacles. It has more than 12,000 inhabitants and an immense brick factory working night and day.

The dry season in western Oregon and the cool spring in eastern Oregon are making the hay crop rather short. Several farmers in previous short hay years have saved their stock by filling their silos with various available crops during the summer. Weedy grain, Canada thistles and grain, road side mowings, other waste crops, etc., while often not making the best of silage, will carry much stock through the winter. Every silo should be full this fall.—O. A. C. Experiment Station.

**WALNUT BLIGHT LESS SEVERE**

Walnut and filbert blight are less severe than last season, due to the late spring and warm dry weather. Both blights are bacterial diseases. No remedy has yet been found for walnut blight. The disease attacks the young filbert trees, affecting the new shoots and suckers. The suckers should be removed as soon as the blight appears. This appears to be a year unfavorable to the development of apple scab.—O. A. C. Experiment Station.
