SEEK TO RECALL CLATSOP SHERIFF

Petitions have been filed with the county clerk of Clatsop county and signed by 1400 or more voters asking that a special election be called so that the voters of Clatsop may express their opinion as to whether or not Sheriff Ole Nelson shall be recalled. E. H. Flagg, editor of the Warrenton News and former editor of the St. Helens Mist, was one of the leading advocates of the recall. Sheriff Nelson is accused of being drunk while on duty and of failure to enforce the prohibition law. The recall election will be held on August 11.

In reference to the recall election The Daily Astorian of Thursday says:

"Indications as to who will be the candidate for the office of sheriff of Clatsop county against Ole Nelson, the present incumbent at recall election on August 11, have centered on O. B. Setters, local attorney and candidate for the republican nomination for the circuit judgeship at the recent primaries.

"While Mr. Setters up to the present time has made no statement in regard to the matter friends state that they are certain that he will make the race and declare that he will have the backing of the Astoria Law Enforcement League and the Ku Klux Klan.

"The lection notices have already been printed and will be mailed out to the precincts in a few days. The county clerk's office force is busily at work preparing the necessary tally sheets for the balloting. Filing of candidates will close Tuesday, August 1, as all names must be in prior to ten days before the election takes place.

"NANOOK OF NORTH" IS WONDER FILM

"Nanook of the North," a picture made at the top of the world and one depicting the life story of an Eskimo family, will be shown at The Liberty on Sunday and Monday, with the usual afternoon performances on Sunday. "Nanook of the North" had its first showing in Portland during the past fortnight, and so great were the crowd that its engagement was lengthened by half, closing with hundreds still standing in line unable to view the remarkable feature.

"Nanook of the North" is a true, living story of a life that is stark and dramatic; a life that is tragic to civilization but happy and peaceful to the Eskimo, that wonderful race that lives in the frozen vastness at the top of the world. While this film, produced 800 miles north of civilization, is the story of the life of an Eskimo family, in some subtle way it unfolds a tale full of love and fidelity; danger, thrills and suspense, humor and pathos and great pictorial beauty.

The greatest motion picture critics of today say unanimous that "words are too feeble to do credit to this remarkable film, which stamps itself indelibly on the memory and tugs mightily at the emotions."

RAILROAD COMPANY CHANGES SCHEDULE

Effective Saturday, July 29, the schedule which the S. P. & S. R. R. company has had in effect for the past month, will be changed. Instead of having so many through trains which did not give any local service, the traffic department evidently realizing their mistake, have prepared a schedule and train service which should meet with the approval of the traveling public.

Train 29, the Seaside Limited, will leave St. Helens at 9:09 a. m., and Train 21, the Astoria local, leaves here at 9:30 a. m., making all the local stops. Train No. 25 is a new local which runs through to Seaside. It leaves Portland at 1:05 p. m. and St. Helens at 2:17 p. m. and does all local work to Astoria. Train No. 27, the Rainier local, leaves Portland at 4:35 instead of 5:15 as under the old schedule. It arrives in St. Helens at 5:52. The through Astoria and Seaside train No. 23 leaves Portland as heretofore, 6:20 p. m. and St. Helens at 7:14.

Towards Portland the new schedule, provides that Train No. 26, the Rainier local, arrives in St. Helens at 8:52 a. m. Train 22 from Seaside arrives here at 11:10 and Train No. 28, the new local, leaves Astoria at 2 o'clock p. m., arriving in St. Helens at 4:50 p. m. Train No. 24, the Seaside-Portland local, arrives here at 7:04 and Train No. 32, the limited from Seaside, arrives here at 9:34 p. m.

The convenience of the schedule and the ample train service should appeal to the traveling public and no doubt the passenger traffic of the railroad will show a marked increase.
