The examination will be open to only citizens who actually reside in the territory of the post office where the vacancy exists and is open to both men and women.

PATROL SYSTEM FOR THE ROADS

The federal government requires the several states to maintain federal aid roads after they have been built, writes Charles Pierce Burton in Harper's Magazine. This is leading inevitably to a general adoption by the states of the patrol system of maintenance, which has been brought to great perfection in France.

The patrol system is intensified maintenance. A section of from five to ten miles is allotted to one man

who constantly watches for defects and repairs a break at once, instead of waiting for the entire road to go to pieces before doing anything that until recently, was the American plan.
