OREGON PEOPLE USE LIBRARIES

SALEM, Ore.—Public libraries of Oregon not only meet the requirements of the American Library association, but in many instances exceed the circulation per capita requirements. The libraries are being operated on a plane of efficiency not surpassed by libraries in other sections of the country. Such are the statements of Miss Cornelia Marvin, state librarian, who has recently prepared statistics on Oregon library conditions.

In circulation per capita, Oregon public libraries made an excellent showing, seven of them exceeding the requirements of the national association. Medford ranked first, with a circulation per capita of 11.3, and was closely followed by Ashland with a per capita circulation of 10. Other cities ranked as follows: The Dalles, Marshfield, Portland, La Grande, Baker, Bend, Albany, Pendleton.

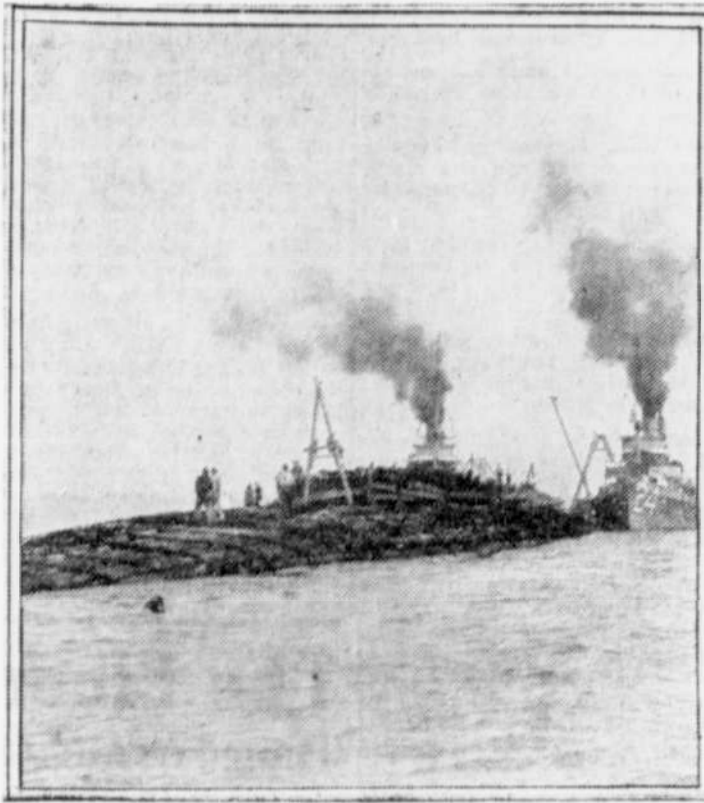

BIG LOG RAFT COMPLETES 1000-MILE JOURNEY



Aided by two U. S. Navy Mine Sweepers the largest log raft ever built, ended its voyage successfully by sea from the Columbia river to San Diego, Calif., recently. 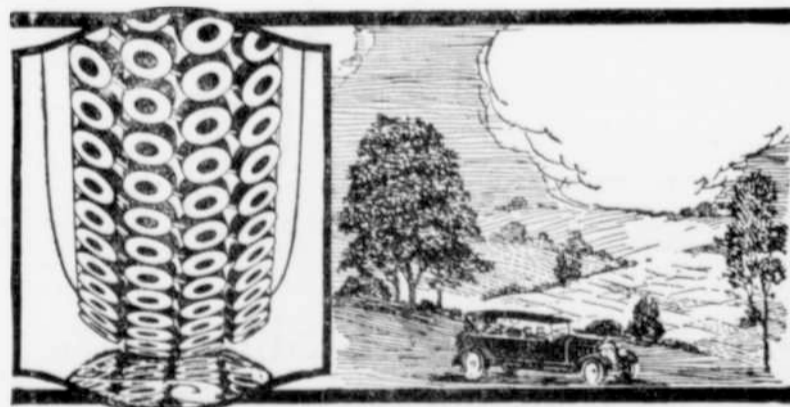
