RAIL GIANTS ARRIVE TO SERVE THE WEST

Moving in two special trains, 12 new "2-10-2" type locomotives, valued at nearly a million dollars and assigned to the Southern Pacific company for use on its Pacific system lines, have just arrived on the coast via El Paso, Texas.

These huge engines, the second consignment of an order of 56 placed by the Southern Pacific company with the Baldwin Locomotive Works, are to be put into service on the Southern Pacific lines across the Tehachap and Siskiyou mountains. They are equipped with the latest fuel conservation and auxiliary power devices.

Evidence of the Southern Pacific company's faith in the Pacific coast is shown by the fact that the order for these locomotives was placed with the manufacturers in October, 1921, at a time when business conditions were unstable and the future less promising.
