

FARM POINTERS

Fowls Appreciate Comfort.

Fowls must be comfortable to be profitable. Successful poultrymen keep this in mind when planning their poultry houses. In building the poultry house, the first consideration should be given to location. Often a poultry house is planned and even built before it is decided where it is to be located. Drafts, undue exposure, and poor soil conditions, particularly from the standpoint of drainage, could be avoided if a little thought were given to the location of the building before it is constructed. Size of the house is the next thing to consider. The ground space should be considered before determining the size of the flock and in turn the size of the poultry house. Sufficient land should be available, provided the fowls are to be kept year after year, to furnish two or more fields which should be kept well cultivated.

Cow Weeding Pays.

The cost of raising a calf to the weaning stage on the range is the cost of running the cow plus depreciation, interest, and bull service, providing there is a calf for every cow. If there is only 60 per cent of a calf crop, the cost of the calf is 1.4 times the cost of running one cow. The larger the calf crop, therefore, the cheaper the production. Being more economical production by weeding out all barren cows and such as are diseased. Success in the livestock business will hinge on careful management tending toward cutting cut losses.

Best Feed for Lambs.

Lambs that come off the range half fat offer an opportunity to the stockman to increase their value by feeding. Good alfalfa hay—all they will eat—and 1 pound of grain makes a good ration for fattening lambs. They will gain from one-fourth to one-third of a pound daily. The killing market is a poor place for a partially finished lamb. A well finished lamb, on the other hand, is a choice morsel in any market.

RECIPES

Potato Shells With Crab Meat.

Carefully remove the pulp from the skins of baked potatoes and press through ricer. Fill the skins about one-half full of the seasoned rice potato. Melt 3 tablespoons butter, add 1 finely chopped slice of onion and 1 chili pepper and cook very slowly until the onion and pepper are tender. Then remove pepper and onion and add 3 tablespoons flour, sifted with 1 teaspoon salt. Blend well, add 1½ cups milk and stir constantly until smooth and creamy. Add 2 cups crab flakes, mix well and use as a filling for the potato casings. Garnish with crisp sprigs of parsley.

Brother Jonathan.

Make a mush of yellow corn meal and mold in cylindrical molds, such as baking powder cans. Let stand until next day and cut in slices. Arrange slices on a large porcelain plate in pyramidal form, sprinkle each layer with some hard sharp grated cheese and season with red pepper. Sift buttered crumbs freely over the whole, brown in a hot oven and serve as a vegetable with fish. Sour grape jelly poured over it gives a nice tart flavor.

Banana Cream.

Peel and chop six bananas very fine, then put them on to boil in a quart of water, the juice of a lemon and a cup and a half of sugar. Boil until the banana is soft and cooked, turn the mixture onto the beaten yolks of two eggs, stir until blended, then set to cool. When cold, add a pint of cream and freeze. This makes a rich cream, and cooking the fruit takes off the raw taste.

Egg Croquettes.

Boil six eggs 30 minutes until the yolks are mealy, chop fine also two slices of cooked bacon (possibly left over from breakfast), make a white sauce, add chopped parsley and a touch of lemon juice; mix with the chopped eggs and bacon, and set in refrigerator to get cold. At noon make into croquettes. Roll in egg and crumbs and fry in deep fat. Add salt and pepper to the white sauce.

To prevent blue from fading put an ounce of sugar of lead in a nail of water, soak the goods in this for two hours, let it dry before washing and ironing. This is good for all shades of blue.

NOTICE TO FRUIT GROWERS AND DEALERS.

Attention is called to the following extracts from 1920 horticultural laws of Oregon:

Par. 8881. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to import or sell any infested or diseased fruit of any kind in the state of Oregon, except that such fruit may be sold to evaporators, fruit canneries, fruit product factories, or other by-product factories under the following conditions:

First. Such fruit so sold shall be used solely for the production of manufactured fruit products, beverages, or other manufactured products, or by-products.

Second. The nature of the infestation or infection shall not be such as to make the article of food or beverage manufactured from such fruit unhealthful or unfit for use as a food or beverage.

As the foregoing extract declares it unlawful to sell infested or diseased fruit, notice is hereby given that after September 10th inspections will be made of all fruit found in hands of dealers, and wherever same is found to be infected with San Jose scale or worms or other pests or disease, infected fruit will be seized and destroyed.
