

CITIZENS ARE INVITED TO DISCUSS ORDINANCE

Council Wants Citizens to Attend the Council Meeting and Express Their Opinion on Proposed Ordinance Relative to Interurban Stage Terminal.

The following ordinance has been introduced and the council is asked to pass it. Before doing so the council wishes to ascertain the views of the residents of St. Helens and of those interested in the ordinance. The ordinance will come up for the second reading. The ordinance is an important one and every citizen interested should be present at the council meeting so that the council may ascertain the wishes of those whom they serve.

Proposed Ordinance.

ORDINANCE NO. 286.
An Ordinance Providing for Interurban Stage Terminals Within the City of St. Helens, Oregon, and for the Regulation and Care Thereof.

THE CITY OF ST. HELENS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The word "Street" in this ordinance shall mean any street, road, strip of land used as a road, alley, highway, road or way within said city.

The word "Person" herein shall mean any person, firm or corporation, and the singular number shall include the plural, and the masculine pronoun shall include the feminine.

The term "Interurban stage" shall mean any self-propelled vehicle used for transportation of passengers for hire on the streets of said City of St. Helens and operating between points one or more of which are within, and one or more of which are without said City.

The word "Terminal" shall mean the place in said City of St. Helens where any interurban stage or stages regularly stop for the purpose of taking on or discharging passengers, baggage or freight.

Section 2. TERMINAL-PROHIBITED DISTRICT. No person shall hereafter operate any interurban stage or stages in the said City of St. Helens without providing a terminal therefor in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance; provided, however, that no such terminals shall be located within the following described district, to-wit: Commencing at a point where the westerly boundary line of St. Helens street intersects the Columbia River in said City, and running thence westerly along said northern boundary line of St. Helens street to its point of intersection with the westerly line of Oak street in said City; thence southerly following said westerly boundary line of Oak street to the southerly boundary of said City; thence easterly to the easterly boundary of said City; and thence northerly to the point of beginning.

Section 3. STAGES NOW OPERATING. Every person now operating an interurban stage or stages in the City of St. Helens, shall within 40 days after this ordinance becomes effective adopt and maintain a terminal therefor, in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 4. STAGES HEREAFTER OPERATED. Every person hereafter commencing the operation of an interurban stage, or stages, shall adopt and maintain a terminal therefor in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 5. TERMINAL—APPROVAL THEREOF BY THE COMMON COUNCIL. Each such terminal shall be established and maintained on private property in such location as shall be approved by the Common Council of said City, and no such terminal shall be established or maintained upon any street in the City of St. Helens. Each such terminal shall be provided with sanitation facilities, with adequate light, heat and other facilities and conveniences to properly serve the patrons of such interurban stage or stages.

Section 6. APPROVAL—APPLICATION FOR. No terminal for an interurban stage shall be established in the City of St. Helens, unless the same shall have been approved by the Council of said City. Every person proposing to establish such a terminal shall file in writing with the Recorder of said City an application for the approval of such terminal by the said Council, which application shall contain a description of the location of such proposed terminal and a statement showing the facilities and conveniences proposed to be furnished for the patrons of such interurban stage or stages. Thereupon the Recorder shall present such request to the said Council, and the said Council shall then hear and determine said matter and shall approve or disapprove the establishment of such terminal.

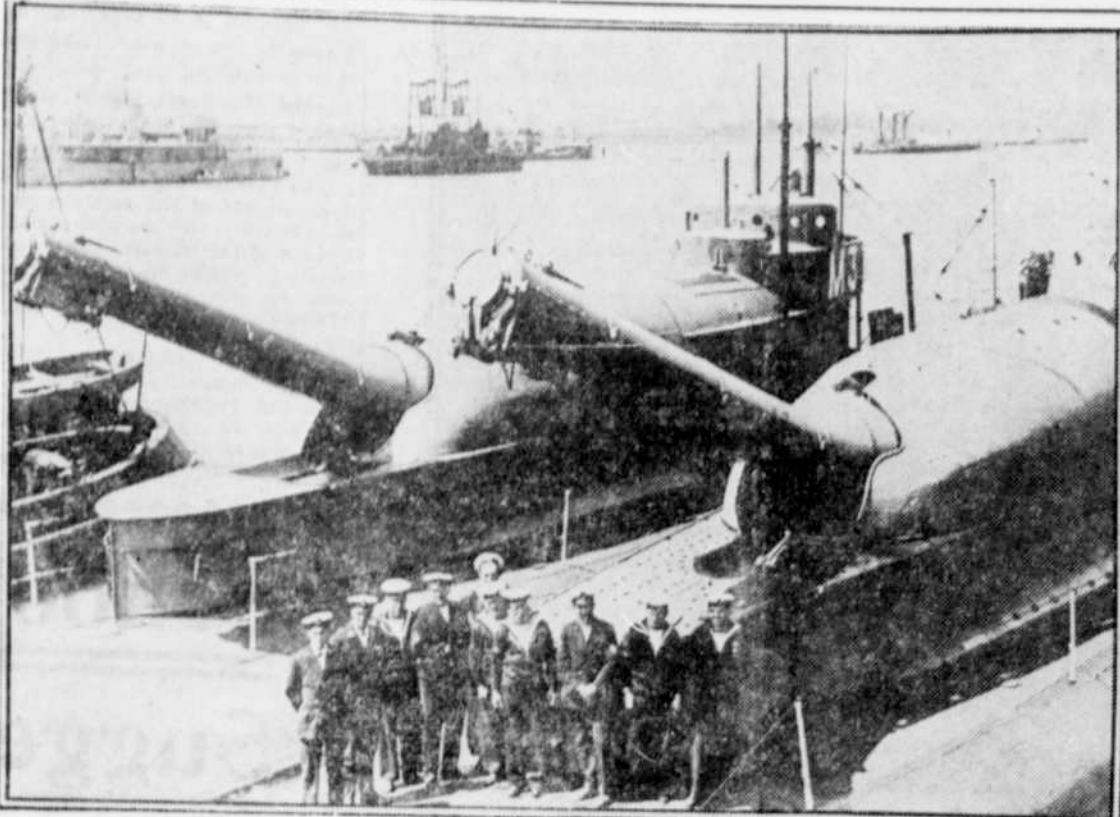

WARRENTON TO VOTE UPON CITY MANAGER

A commission of Warrenton citizens is studying the managerial form of city government, with a view of submitting an amendment to the present form of government which would substitute a city manager for the present councilmanic system.

The commission working on the matter is composed of G. Clifford Barlow, F. M. Wilson, E. H. Flagg, W. N. Francis and E. E. Meyers. It was appointed by the Warrenton Commercial club. It is planned to have the amendment ready for submission to the municipality at a special election in October, so that the new officers may be chosen at the general election in November.

The amendment, as it is drafted at present, provides for a city manager at a salary of not more than \$3,500 a year, with the power of appointing the minor officers. There also will be three commissioners.

OREGON'S FIRST BUSINESS EXCITEMENT

Oregon's first business excitement came in August, 1848, when a little schooner from San Francisco pulled into the wharf at the village of Portland and began to load all the Oregon products obtainable in exchange for a lot of Mexican produce.

After a cleanup was made of all the available products the captain of the visiting craft announced the discovery of gold in California. Very soon gold dust and States money was rolling back into Oregon in exchange for more Oregon products and so wheat was soon eliminated as the circulating legal tender medium.

It was not long before Oregon was digging as much gold out of the sale of its products as the miners were getting in California. Industries began to get a footing in the state and the demand for workers brought additional settlers to Oregon just as the gold digging operations brought more people to California.

As one of the results of this development the manufacture of gold coins was started at Oregon City a few months later. The Oregon City mint was the first on the Pacific Coast and coined \$58,500 in gold money under the sanction of the United States government. The faith of the government in these early days of the possibility of industrial development in Oregon impressed citizens of the state and resulted in the establishment soon afterward of the nucleus of plants from which present day industry developed.
