WHAT THE PAROCHIAL SCHOOL HAS DONE FOR WISCONSIN.

To the Editor: A number of well-intentioned people have brought discredit to themselves in various letters to the state press opposing the proposed compulsory school act.

Wisconsin has been the battleground of the public vs. the parochial school since its entrance as a state. While the "Oregon country" was settled by Americans from the eastern section, Wisconsin's early settlers came mostly from across the Atlantic and did not speak the English language.

The development of the state began in the early 30's by the discovery of lead in the southwestern section. The foreigners who came at this time were Scandinavians.

The foreigners who came at this time were Scandinavians. The American portion were from New York and New England. In 1845 the famous "Irish" drove a number of that nationality to immigrate.

In 1848 and 1850 came the German revolutionary exiles who settled the entire western shore of Lake Michigan. In 1849 came the French Canadian who settled the timber woods.

By their great credit the early Scandinavian settlers Americanized quickly, learned English and American customs sent their children to the district schools so when they followed the Mississippi river up to Minnesota they had very much to do in the history of that state.

Because of the hostile influence of the adherents of the parochial schools Wisconsin's attempt to enact the Minnesota law was a complete failure. One section in each township was set apart as a "school section" to be sold when the needs of the township required it.

But Wisconsin sent over 90,000 soldiers to the civil war and when they returned they were all Americanized and could speak English after a fashion and they elected Brigadier General Samuel Fallows superintendent of public instruction who engineered a bill through the legislature making a certain proportion of all taxes general and special part of the school fund.
