


## PHOTO OF U. S. DESTROYERS THROWING OUT A SMOKE SCREEN

AUTO REGISTRATION  
BLANKS NOW READY

Application blanks for 1923 license have been mailed by the secretary of state to all motor vehicle owners in Oregon, so as to permit them to apply for and receive such licenses before January 1, 1923. Motor vehicle owners will avoid much trouble, annoyance and unnecessary delay by promptly applying for their 1923 licenses upon receipt of the application blanks. Deferring applying for licenses until about the first of the year only congests the work of the secretary of states office and may result in the arrest of the car owners by traffic police for failure to have the 1923 license on their cars after January 1st next. License plates for 1923 will have a dark blue background and white figures and letters.

The following may make an item of interest to your readers and I am giving it in addition to the foregoing for whatever value you may deem attaches to it:

"Up to October 27, 1922, there have been registered and licensed in Oregon 526 motor vehicle dealers, 11,864 chauffeurs, 211,498 motor vehicle operators, 2,162 motorcycles and 131,834 passenger and commercial cars, from which the total license fees aggregate \$3,597,073.98. The fees, less administrative expenses, are distributed one-fourth to the counties from which the registrations are received and three-fourths to the state highway fund for use in road construction and improvement throughout the state generally."

The distribution of the registrations up to September 15, 1922, shows that in Columbia county there were registered 7 motor vehicle dealers, 150 chauffeurs, 445 motor vehicle operators, 45 motorcycles, 1395 passenger cars, 3 ambulances and hearses, 5 buses and stages, 65 commercial cars of less than one ton capacity, 125 trucks of from one to five tons capacity and 12 trailers of from one to five tons capacity, or a total of 1619 licensed passenger and commercial motor vehicles."

RECIPES  
Velvet Rocks.

Cream 1-1/2 cup butter and 2 scant cups brown sugar, add 3 eggs well beaten, then 2 heaping cups white flour sifted with 1-1/2 teaspoon soda, then 1 cup whole wheat flour and 1 cup of ground walnuts. Drop by small teaspoonsfuls and bake 10 to 15 minutes. This recipe makes about five dozen.

## Tough Chicken.

Put into a kettle 1 cup lard and 1-1/2 cup butter. After the chicken is dressed and cut in pieces, add it to the hot fat and let it fry until fat and meat are both brown, stirring occasionally. Remove chicken from the pan and add 1 large onion chopped fine, sage, pepper and salt to taste; let this fry in the fat five minutes, then add 2 large tablespoons flour and let brown, then 1-1/2 pint can of tomatoes and plenty of water to cover the chicken (which has been added). Stew very slowly until done, stirring often to prevent sticking.

Cut slices of stale bread into squares, cutting and removing the crusts. Beat 1 egg in small saucepan, add 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 cup pulp out with the lemon squeezer, milk and cinnamon to taste, stir run the rind through the food chopper over fire until it thickens, do not boil. You can use all the pulp picking out the little segments of skin.

SHIPYARD AWARDED  
GOVT. CONTRACT

The St. Helens Shipbuilding company has been awarded a contract for the construction of two pile drivers by the U. S. Engineering department. The contract calls for the drivers complete, so the company will let a contract to the Hessler Machine works of Portland for the necessary machinery. The cost of the two pile drivers will be around \$25,000 and the contract calls for the completion of the job within 90 days. As a result of the local yard securing the work, 10 or 12 more mechanics will be added to the pay-roll of the shipbuilding company.



## "Off the Hook"

When your telephone is accidentally left "off the hook," the operator first answers as she would if you were placing a call. After repeated efforts, receiving no response, she reports your line as "out of order." It is then disconnected from the regular switchboard and placed on a special board where it awaits the attention of the repairing forces.

All this takes time. It involves tests, reports and generally a trip to the location of the trouble.

In the meantime, what happens?

Others have been unable to reach you by telephone.

Even if the mistake has been discovered and your telephone placed on the hook, service may not be restored until the "troubleman's" final O. K.

On a party line all other telephones on the line are deprived of both incoming and outgoing service for the same period of investigation and repair.

"Off the hook" is a most common cause of interruption to telephone service. By the exercise of care in this connection you will protect your service and avoid inconvenience to yourself and others.
