AMERICAN BIRDS INTRODUCED IN HAWAII

Honolulu—Hawaii will soon be introduced to the Caribbeus Spinicollis, Sturnella Magna, and Grallina Pleata.

These are birds, and their common names are straw-necked ibis, pewee, lark and meadow lark, respectively.

They will be brought to the territory by the board of agriculture and forestry as possible aids in the control of cutworm and fly pests. The suggestion that these birds be introduced was made by Entomologist David Pullaway.
