COUNTY AGENT NEWS

United States grades for potatoes. Recommended by the United States department of agriculture. Continued from last issue.
U. S. No. 1,
U. S. No. 1 shall consist of potatoes of similar varietal characteristics which are not badly misshapen, which are free from freezing injury and soft rot, and from damage that is caused by dirt or other foreign matter, sunburn, second growth, growth cracks, hollow heart, cuts, scab, blight, dry rot, disease, insects, or mechanical or other means.
The diameter of potatoes of round varieties shall be not less than 1 7/8 inches, and of potatoes of long varieties 1 3/4 inches.
In order to allow for variations incident to proper grading and handling, not more than 5 per cent, by weight, of any lot may be below the prescribed size, and in addition, not more than 5 per cent, by weight, may be below the remaining requirements of this grade, but not to exceed one-third of this 5 per cent tolerance shall be allowed for potatoes affected by soft rot.
U. S. No. 1 Small,
U. S. No. 1 Small shall consist of potatoes ranging in size from 1 1/2 inches to 1 7/8 inches in diameter but meeting all the other requirements of U. S. No. 1.
In order to allow for variations incident to proper grading and handling, not more than 25 per cent, by weight, of any lot may vary from the prescribed size, but not to exceed one-fifth of this tolerance shall be allowed for potatoes under 1 1/2 inches in diameter. In addition, not more than 5 per cent, by weight, may be below the remaining requirements of this grade, but not to exceed one-third of this 5 per cent tolerance shall be allowed for potatoes affected by soft rot.
U. S. No. 2,
U. S. No. 2 shall consist of potatoes of similar varietal characteristics which are free from freezing injury and soft rot and from serious damage caused by sunburn, cuts, scab, blight, dry rot, disease, insects, or mechanical or other means.
The diameter of potatoes of this grade shall be not less than 1 1/2 inches.
In order to allow for variations incident to proper grading and handling, not more than 5 per cent, by weight, of any lot may be below the prescribed size, and in addition, not more than 5 per cent, by weight, may be below the remaining requirements of this grade, but not to exceed one-third of this 5 per cent tolerance shall be allowed for potatoes affected by soft rot.

TURKEYS DROPPED.
PORTLAND, Nov. 22.—Local buyers have refused flatly to pay over 22 cents for No. 1 dressed turkeys, and Portland commission firms are compelled to accept the lower level owing to the heavy receipts pouring in daily. Yesterday there were three large express loads of dressed poultry distributed by local firms, and a similar amount in by express today, but counting the heavy arrivals by parcel post and air truck.
Live turkeys are equally plentiful. The market is down to an extreme low of 25 cents and weak at that level.
At the same time outside markets are slumping under the heavy offerings, thus cutting off the outside shipping demand. Seattle buyers will not pay over 73 cents for strictly prime dressed turkeys. In the south top birds are quoted at 42 cents throughout the San Francisco Bay section, with receipts greater than the demand.
Locally, the real holiday rush has not yet started and it is expected that supplies will move out promptly when the demand starts, especially at the new low levels.
Other lines of poultry are equally plentiful with receipts of live fowls filling the street.

Special Potato Inquiry.

A summary of reports received from growers and others on the potato situation as of November 1, 1922, gives the following relative to the Oregon crop:
Per cent unfit for table or seed stock, 22.
Per cent needed for food and seed on farms, 16.
Per cent available for sale, 62.
Per cent of total crop available for shipment outside of the county where grown, 55.
Per cent of total crop which will grade U. S. No. 1 (or equivalent state grade) 47.
Per cent of total crop which will grade U. S. No. 2 (or equivalent state grade,) 26.
Per cent of total crop which will grade U. S. culls (or equivalent state grade,) 27.
The total Oregon crop this year is estimated at 4,830,000 bushels, produced on 46,000 acres, or a yield per acre of 105 bushels. Last year's production was estimated at 3,870,000 bushels, produced on 43,000 acres, a yield of 90 bushels to the acre. The increased production this year is mainly due to increased acreage in irrigated districts, which produce a high yield per acre.
The United States crop for 1922 is now estimated at an average yield of 192.6 bushels per acre with a total production of 433,995,999 bushels compared with last year's yield of 90.9 bushels per acre, and a total production of 346,823,999 bushels.
Carlot movement of the 1922 Oregon crop to November 11 is reported to be 572 cars compared with 361 cars last season to same date. The 1922 movement however has been largely from the early irrigated districts. The October and November car load shipments have been only about 70 per cent of last year for the same period.
