

HUNTERS ARE THE FINEST OF SPORTSMEN

The Six Millions of Dollars They Paid for Licenses This Season is the Smallest Item.

That more than six millions of dollars have been paid into various state treasuries by hunters of large and small game this fall is something that everyone does not know.

The hunters of Pennsylvania paid \$150,000 for the privilege of hunting in that state. Here are some other figures:

No figures have been given out by Delaware, Mississippi, North Carolina, Arkansas, Kansas, Missouri, Arkansas, Illinois or Tennessee, but the figures enumerated above total \$1,329,000. The figures from the other states will total more than another million.

That those who hunt in the field are sportsmen in every sense of the word is proven by answers to a number of telegrams recently sent out by the Portland (Ore.) Chamber of Commerce requesting to know the amount of money sportsmen spent in various places.

The game commission of Fish and Game replied that from \$30,000,000 to \$50,000,000 were left in Maine nearly by those who hunt and fish; from Florida came word that \$250,000,000 were left there by sportsmen each year; Wisconsin placed the figures at \$3,000,000; Denver at \$2,000,000 and San Francisco at \$1,000,000. These five scattered points give a total of \$315,000,000. The Portland Chamber of Commerce wanted these answers to refute any argument that it doesn't pay to enter to sportsmen.
