BETTER ROAD LAWS.

There is a universal movement on foot all over the state for the purpose of amending our road laws, and to perfect a better system for collecting road taxes and improving the roads.

WHEREAS: The present system of working the public roads in this state is entirely inadequate to keep the roads in repair, or to meet the rapidly increasing demands of public travel, and

WHEREAS: The present road law is deemed insufficient in its provisions to provide sufficient funds for road purposes, therefore,

RESOLVED: That our representatives in the legislature, to be elected next June, be and are hereby earnestly requested to use their utmost endeavor to procure an amendment to the road laws of the state as follows:

1. Authorizing the county clerks of the several counties in the state to furnish to the county assessors a full and complete description of each of the road districts in his county which districts shall have been laid out and described by the county assessors and entered on the records of the county.

2. Requiring the county assessors to assess the county by districts as furnished by the clerk and to make return of the same as now required.

3. Authorizing the county court at the time of levying taxes for county purposes to levy a tax upon all the taxable property in the county and to be known as the road fund, and in addition thereto, a poll tax of two dollars be assessed upon every person who shall be liable to pay a state tax, and five mills on the dollar or a less amount, if in the judgment of the court a less amount will be deemed sufficient to place the roads in the different road districts in good repair.

4. Such road fund, when collected and paid over to the treasurer by the sheriff, shall designate the amount so collected from each road district in the county, which road fund the treasurer shall be required to place to the credit of each road district, and shall be used in laying out, opening and repairing county roads, and building and repairing bridges in said road districts.

5. Requiring the road supervisor to furnish vouchers or time checks to all persons performing labor or furnishing material for the public roads or public bridges in his road district, which vouchers shall state the time and kind of labor performed, and the kind of material furnished, and the price to be paid for such labor and material, and said voucher shall be submitted to the county court for its approval and to be paid only upon the order of the county court as in other cases.

6. The county clerks in issuing said orders or warrants upon the treasurer shall state in said warrants the number of road districts to be charged with the same, and the treasurer, upon the payment of said warrant shall charge the proper road district with the amount.

7. That the county treasurer be further required to make and publish a semi-annual statement of the amount received, the amount paid, and the amount remaining on hand which stands to the credit of the several road districts in his county. Such statement of road funds, herein required, to be made at the same time and in the same manner that other semi-annual statements are now required to be made and published.

8. That all laws now in force requiring the payment of money for road purposes be repealed.

OREGON APPROPRIATION BILL.

The house river and harbor bill has been completed by the committee on river and harbor appropriations and will be submitted to the house this week. It provides for larger appropriations for the different points along the Columbia than those of the last congress. The items as embodied in the bill for Oregon are as follows:

Columbia river at the Cascades..... \$435,000
Mouth of the Columbia..... 300,000
Coos Bay..... 210,000
Yaquina Bay..... 75,000
Hualay river..... 10,000
Tillamook Bay..... 15,000
Lower Willamette and Columbia..... 50,000
Coquille river..... 25,000
Upper Coquille river..... 5,000
Yamhill river to McNamara..... 4,000
Upper Columbia and Snake river..... 150,000
Willamette river to Eugene City, with a commencement of the special work at Oregon, Clackamas Rapids, Corvallis, Independence and Salem..... 30,000

In addition to the above appropriation, Representative Hermann is endeavoring to secure money for the improvement of the Nehalem river, in which he will very likely be successful in some degree, although it is a great deal harder to secure relief from congress for a small river than the larger ones. But Mr. Hermann is always alert and on the look out for these smaller streams, and hopes to be able to get something for the Nehalem at this session.

SHINGLE MANUFACTURERS in this section are in cheerful spirits over the outlook for 1892. Prices are yet too low; still, when a mill is located and properly managed, there is a margin of profit to the owner. At least three-fourths of the red cedar shingle manufacturers are maintaining prices and the small fraction that are not cut but little figure in the Eastern trade. Some old contracts from 1891 are being filled, but buyers realize that after they are completed that they will have to pay the regular market prices. Dealers would just as soon pay \$2 for red cedar shingles as \$1.75 if they felt confident that price would be maintained.—West Coast Lumberman.

C. W. SCHOFIELD, the Astoria railroad contractor, told an Oregonian reporter Tuesday that piles were being driven at the Washington cannery for the temporary depot. He also stated that a great deal of preliminary work was necessary, and that the surveys were working around Young's bay, through both private and city property. This looks like business, and the people along the proposed route are jubilant over the prospects of a railroad.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From Our Regular Correspondent.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 18, 1892.

The president having become satisfied that Lord Salisbury was purposely delaying his answer to the dispatch sent him on the 7th inst., for the purpose of allowing the fleet of Canadian seal poachers to get to sea before this government had any opportunity to serve notice upon the owners of the vessels to keep out of Behring sea, this week directed acting Secretary of State Wharton, to inform Sir Julian Pauncefote, the British minister, that he desired an answer to that dispatch at the earliest possible moment. The president's reason for desiring an early answer is, that upon the nature of that answer will depend the wording of the orders issued to the revenue cutters and naval vessels, which will shortly be sent to Behring sea. The request will also have the effect of convincing Lord Salisbury that the president means business and does not propose to put up with any nonsense, even from the alleged "mistress of the seas," Lord Salisbury has promised an early answer.

The dangerous illness of Senator Morrill has cast a gloom over the senate wing of the capitol, where every one is the friend of the senior Vermont senator. His age gives him but a slim chance in fighting pneumonia, which is the dreaded foe of the strong old men. Mr. Morrill has been in congress, first in the house and then in the senate, since 1853.

Secretary Blaine continues to improve, although he has not yet ventured out of the house. He has not decided upon taking a trip to the south, but he may do so.

Secretary Foster has returned much improved in health by his flying trip to Europe, and he also picked up while in England in an unofficial way, some financial information that will be found useful to him in his official capacity.

Commissioner Raum took the wind out of Representative Cooper's sails by telling the house investigating committee, that while ready and willing to answer any question or to give any desired information about the pension office or anything relating thereto, he would not answer questions about matters pertaining exclusively to his private business affairs. The commissioner is generally commended for having taken that stand. His official acts are properly under the control of congress, but with his private acts and business, congress has nothing to do.

The president and Secretary Elkins were compelled by pressure of important public business to decline invitations to attend the annual St. Patrick's day banquet of the Hibernian Society of Philadelphia.

Columbia, Hayti, and Venezuela are the only countries that will feel the heavy retaliatory hand of Uncle Sam, all the rest of the countries concerned, having either completed reciprocity agreements with us or got them so near completion as to let them out. The president's proclamation issued this week restores the duty upon sugar, hides, coffee and tea, from the above named countries until such time as they shall give public notice of their having removed the duties they now impose upon the agricultural and other products of this country. It speaks volumes for the success of reciprocity that only three countries have to be retaliated upon.

A Correction.

We wish to call attention to the following orders made by the county court at its last session, which is republished in order to correct an error which appeared in last week's issue. Please note the change in the following orders:

In the matter of the establishment of a county road beginning on the section line between sections 24 and 25, township 5 north, range 3 west, where the county road known as the George Fichtel road intersects said section line; thence west to the east line of section 27, township 5 north, range 3 west; thence in a southwest course to and terminating at the intersection of the Nehalem and St. Helens road at or near what is known as Cow Camp on said St. Helens and Nehalem road. It appearing to the court that said viewers had met at the time and place appointed, accompanied by A. B. Little, a skillful surveyor and after being duly sworn had viewed out, surveyed, marked and located a county road as above described, it is therefore ordered that the said road shall be considered a public highway, and the supervisor of said road district is hereby authorized to open the same.

In the matter of the appraisors report of damages on the W. W. West road, running through the lands of John E. Watts; it appearing to the court that the viewers had met at the time and place appointed and by personal examinations had viewed said route and ascertained how much less valuable said lands of the said John E. Watts would be made by the opening of said road and having assessed the damages at the sum of \$350, it is ordered by the court that the said report of appraisors be and the same is hereby accepted, and it is further ordered by the court that the petitioners for said road pay the damages caused by the opening of said road in the sum of \$350, and that when said damages have been paid and receipts for the same shall have been filed with the clerk of the county court, that a road shall be ordered opened and declared a public highway.

Call for a REPUBLICAN County Convention.

A republican convention for the county of Columbia is called to meet at St. Helens, Oregon, on Thursday, March 25, at 2 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of nominating candidates for county officers of the said county, electing delegates to the state convention, and to transact any other business that may come before the convention.

The same being one delegate at large from each precinct and one delegate for every 50 votes, and one for every fraction over one half thereof cast for congressman at the June election in 1890.

The committee recommend that the primaries be held on Saturday, March 19, and that the delegates elected attend in person. By order of the committee.
