Attorney Rice has been in attendance on the district court for Washington county, at Hillsboro this week.

Monday morning an entire block was burned in Portland bounded by Washington, Sixth, Stark and Seventh streets.

The Kellogg is laid up this week with a broken shaft. In the meantime the Toledo takes her place on the Cowitz route.

Supreme Judge Moore came down from Salena and spent Sunday at home. Mrs. Moore accompanied him back to Salena on Monday.

Sheriff Massie paid an official visit to Westport and Mist Monday, to levy on some real estate at the former place returning Tuesday.

Captain E. W. Spencer, the veteran steamboat man, has been appointed chief of police for the city of Portland, vice S. B. Parrish, removed.

Mr. Albert Tozier, one of Portland's veteran newspaper men, has been appointed secretary of the Oregon Press Association. All correspondence intended for the association should be addressed to Mr. Tozier, at Portland.

Mr. Harry West, of Scappoose, stepped into THE MIST office Tuesday with a package of green gooseberries averaging three and three-eighths inches in circumference. This is no fairy tale, and the berries can be seen by calling at this office.

As is usual about this time of the year, when the seaside-resort keepers are looking for more patronage than they are getting, a whale has washed ashore on North Beach, which is said to be seventy-five feet in length. This is the same old tale to excite people to the beach.

The people of Milwaukie, by petition, demand that Wilson be returned to the county jail at Oregon City, there to await his trial; and also petition that Judge McBride call a special term of the district court at once, that the beast may meet justice as soon as possible.

The steamboat combination is again in trouble, and the Telephone is not carrying the mail now in consequence thereof. Another war seems certain in the near future between the Telephone and Union Pacific boats. The Potter is carrying the mail running along with the Telephone.

The Judson and Giant powder works near West Berkeley, Cal., blew up last Saturday, killing five men, and almost completely destroying that city as well as other cities near by, including a great deal of damage in San Francisco. The loss to the powder company is said to be \$200,000.

Quite a little excitement was caused here Sunday by a team belonging to I. Bumgardner running away. They started from the wharf, running to the corner by Dr. Cliff's office where they stopped having run the wagon against the sidewalk. The wagon escaped with a broken tongue, but the sidewalk was left in a pretty dilapidated condition.

Last Friday J. D. Birdsall, of Columbia City, was arrested charged with carrying concealed weapons on complaint sworn out by S. W. Spooner, and brought before Justice Blakesley for trial. The justice fined him \$10 and costs. Mr. Spooner swore out a second complaint for assault and battery, which was afterwards dismissed at the request of complainant.

The county court last Friday let the contract to Huffman & Bates for the construction of a bridge across Milton creek at Houlton. In considering the proposition the court could not agree, so it was necessary to put it to a vote. For the bridge, Blanchard and Barnes; against, Schoonover. The contract calls for the main span 115 feet long with steel piers at either end, to cost \$1,600. When this bridge is completed it will be one of the best bridges in the county, and will not only be a great accommodation to the people in that immediate vicinity, but the Nehalem valley as well, as a large part of the traffic from the middle and upper Nehalem comes out this way. The court's action in the matter is commendable. Whenever a bridge is built it should be sound and substantial, one that will last; otherwise it would be money thrown away. If the court will follow this rule and make substantial improvements, even though it is only a few bridges each year, and meet the requirements as far as possible, in a few years Columbia county will be in good shape so far as roads and bridges are concerned.

A hand-to-hand battle occurred at the Gem and Frisco mines, near Wallace, Idaho, Monday, between union and non-union miners, each armed with Winchester rifles. Five persons were killed and sixteen wounded. The latest reports are to the effect that Van B. DeLushmutt, owner of some of the mines, has been captured by the strikers and secreted in some unknown place, and by some it is feared he may have been foully dealt with. Troops from Vancouver, Walla Walla and other places have been sent to the scene of disorder. The strikers have deposited dynamite under the different mines, and say that on the arrival of troops the mines will be blown up. The excitement is intense in that whole state.

William Strachan has a contract for getting out 300,000 Belgian blocks for street-paving purposes. The contract comes from E. J. Jeffery, of Portland. It will furnish employment for fifteen or twenty men for about a year.

Last Sunday night in Portland a cable car coming down from Portland Heights ran away down the hill, and by turning over at the corner of Jefferson street, killed one man and injured seriously a number of others.

The steamer Wilmington, plying between Portland and British Columbia points, was boarded by Collector Taylor, at Astoria, Monday, and 1000 pounds of smuggled opium seized.

Mr. Israel Spencer, of Vernonia, passed through St. Helens Monday on his way to Portland, where he had been summoned as a United States district grand juror.

The supreme court has adjourned until October and Judge Moore returned home Wednesday for his summer vacation.

Frank Miles is appointed by Sheriff Massie as deputy.

Weather and Crop Bulletin.

For the week ending Tuesday, July 12.

WESTERN OREGON.

Weather—The week has been cool, partly cloudy, and on the 11th showers prevailed. The temperature has averaged from three to five degrees below the normal. Unusually fresh winds have prevailed. There has been a deficiency in the amount of sunshine.

Crops—The cool weather was extremely favorable to growing vegetation, and did much to help it. The showers on the 11th were not well distributed, nor were they heavy enough to be of that benefit that is desired. More rain within the next five days would improve the condition of cereals and root crops fully 50 per cent. Spring wheat will hardly be over 70 per cent. of an average; fall wheat indicates about 85 per cent. of an average crop.

Headings have begun in Jackson county. The wheat is not turning out very well. The condition of corn has improved considerably, and it is in tassel and offers better prospects. Oats, barley and rye are good crops, but not an average. The second crop of alfalfa is being cut, and where it has been irrigated, is turning out very well. The timothy, clover and grain hay are about all cut and secured, and, as a rule, very good crops were obtained. Hops are growing well, but the hop lice are becoming more plentiful, though in a few localities they are not so bad yet as they were last year. If the lice are conquered there will be a good yield of hops.

Peaches will be ripe in a few days in Southern Oregon. Strawberries are about over. Rasp and blackberries are yet plentiful. Early apples are ripening. Cherries are now in their height of season, the Royal Ann and Black Republican not being as prolific this year as common, nor have they the size and flavor as usual.

EASTERN OREGON.

Crops—The cool weather and partly cloudy sky have been of great benefit to growing grain. General and heavy rains would yet be of inestimable good to much of the grain, especially to that sown late in the spring. In the absence of rain, the prevailing conditions are the most favorable. It is generally conceded that in all sections an half crop is that sown late in the spring. Heading has commenced in a few localities, but will not be general until next week. Range feed is good and stock is in excellent condition.

With continued cool, partly cloudy weather, and no rain falling, the wheat crop, while not an average, will be fair; with good rains the yield will be very good.

In the matter of the establishment of a county road beginning at the sw corner of Mrs. E. M. Slavens' land claim at a post marked "R," said post being the terminus of the Slavens road, it being the sw corner of the ne 1/4 of sec 27, T 4 N, R 2 W, in the said county; thence n 1/2 mile on the line; thence e 1/2 mile on the line between E. M. Slavens and Phillip Neer's land; thence n 1/2 mile, and terminating at a road stake marked "R," in the center of Martin road at the sw corner of Hale's place. Said proposed road to be forty feet in width, and shall follow the subdivision lines the entire length. Viewers, M. Saxon, Henry Larsen, and H. T. Grewell; surveyor, A. B. Little. Ordered that the said viewers and surveyor meet at the residence of Phillip Neer on the 15th day of August, 1892, and failing to meet on that day then within five days thereafter, and after being duly qualified, view, lay out, survey and mark said proposed county road, and make a report to this court in writing of their doings thereon, on or before the first Monday in September, 1892.

In the matter of peddlers' license for Columbia county: Now on this day this matter coming on regularly to be heard, and it appearing to the court that the statute of Oregon provided that peddlers should pay a license of not less than \$10 annually or more than \$200 for the privilege of peddling in each county, unless otherwise ordered by the court; and it further appearing to the court that in their opinion \$10 per annum is not sufficient. Ordered by the court that the sum of \$60 per annum be charged peddlers for the privilege of peddling in and through Columbia county, Or.

In the matter of the rebate of tax of Wm Barr for the year 1891. Ordered by the court that a rebate of tax on the sum of \$300 be allowed the said Wm Barr; and it is further ordered by the court that the county clerk draw a warrant on the county treasurer in favor of Wm. Barr in the sum of \$7.50 in payment of said rebate.

In the matter of the viewers' report on the road petitioned for by Nelson Pinekey and others: It is therefore now ordered and adjudged by the court that Josiah Konkle, John Lamberson and Lindley Meeker be, and they are hereby appointed appraisers to appraise damages if any there be, and that they meet on the 25th day of July, 1892, at the beginning of said road near the residence of J. F. Schmidt.

In the matter of the viewers' report on the road petitioned for by L. F. Banzer and others: Now on this day

this matter coming on to be heard upon the second reading of the report of the viewers heretofore appointed, and it appearing to the court that said road as so surveyed and laid out was located within the town limits of the incorporated town of Rainier, and as an order of this court had been heretofore made that no expense for laying out roads within the corporate limits of any town in Columbia county would be paid by the county court, ordered that said viewers' report and petition for said road be not allowed or accepted.

In the matter of bids advertised for the building of a county bridge across Milton creek near Milton station in Columbia county, Oregon: It appears to the court that the bid of Hoffman & Bates, with the plans and specifications submitted by them were the best so submitted to the court. It is therefore ordered by the court that the contract to build said bridge be, and the same is hereby let to Hoffman & Bates in the sum of \$1600, and that the said Hoffman & Bates sign a contract with the judge and county commissioners, acceptable to all parties interested, and that the said Hoffman & Bates file a bond in the sum of \$1600 for the faithful completion of said bridge.

In the matter of the appointment of a county assessor for Columbia county, Oregon: It appearing to the court that the county assessor-elect, W. H. Kyser, had failed to qualify and file his bond as assessor on the day required by law, ordered that W. H. Kyser be, and he is hereby appointed county assessor of Columbia county, Oregon, for the next ensuing two years, whereupon the said W. H. Kyser files his bond and the same was accepted and approved by the court, and he was duly sworn in as county assessor.

In the matter of the establishment of a county road beginning at the quarter post between sections 25 and 26, T 6 N, R 5 W; thence in a southerly course to, and terminating at the section corners of sections 25 and 26 in said town and range. Allowed by the court and ordered opened.

In the matter of the establishment of a county road beginning at a stake marked "R" about 40 rods ne of the 1/4 mile stake on the east line of sec 12, T 4 N, R 5 W; thence in a northerly direction to, and termination at the ne corner of sec 36, T 5 N, R 5 W. Allowed by the court and ordered opened.

In the matter of the establishment of change in a county road, petitioned for by J. M. Peterson and others: Beginning at a stake marked "R" which stands on the center line of section 29, T 6 N, R 4 W; thence west to, and terminating at a stake marked "B" on the center line 130 rods west of said section 29. Allowed by the court and ordered opened.

In the matter of the establishment of a county road beginning at the 1/2 section post between sections 25 and 26, T 6 N, R 5 W; thence in a westerly course to, and terminating at a stake marked "R" on the county line between Columbia and Clatsop counties, 10 rods n of sw corner of sec 30, T 6 N, R 5 W. In the matter of the change of the St. Helens and Nehalem valley county road petitioned for by H. A. Corliss and others: Now on this day this matter coming on to be heard, after having been laid over from last term of county court on account of bills of damage filed by H. O. Howard and F. A. Crouse, and the court being fully advised in the matter, and it appearing to the court that said road had been regularly traveled for more than ten years by the public as a public highway, and that by reason of the statute of limitation said road is a public highway. It is therefore ordered

and adjudged by the court that said bills of damage of H. O. Howard and F. A. Crouse be, and they are hereby ordered overruled, and that said road be laid out on the town line as petitioned for in said petition, and that the same be opened by the read supervisor of the district in which said road lies.

In the matter of the viewers' report on the road petitioned for by J. W. Guild and others: Now on this day this matter coming on regularly to be heard, and it appearing to the viewers and surveyor heretofore appointed by the court to view out and survey said road had not met at the time and place appointed on account of the high water overflowing portions of said road. It is therefore ordered by the court that the same viewers and surveyor meet at the residence of J. W. Guild on Wednesday, August 3, 1892; then proceed to view, survey, mark out and locate a proposed county road, and that they report in writing to the court their doings thereon, on or before the first Monday in September, 1892.

In the matter of the appointment of a justice of the peace for Scappoose precinct: It is ordered by the court that A. D. Holliday be, and he is hereby appointed justice of the peace in and for Scappoose precinct, Columbia Co., Oregon, to serve until the next general election.

In the matter of the rebate of tax of James Dart for the year 1891: Now on this day comes James Dart and asks the court that a rebate of tax be allowed him for the year 1891, and it appearing to the court from the affidavit of the said James Dart that a mortgage which he held for \$878.65 had been assessed at full value, and that prior to the time when said mortgage was assessed the sum of \$500 had been paid on said mortgage and was not taxable and therefore asks the court that a rebate of \$7.50 be allowed him, and the court being fully advised in the matter, it is ordered by the court that a rebate of \$7.50 be allowed the said James Dart, and that the clerk draw a warrant on the treasurer in the sum of \$7.50 in payment of the same.
