The steamer Wilmington was again held at Astoria last Sunday, and on an inspection by Collector Taylor, about 400 pounds of opium was discovered. As usual, the captain denied all knowledge of the drug being on board. It seems that every time this vessel enters the Columbia she is found guilty of this smuggling business. It might be as well for the treasury department to dispense with her service as a common carrier altogether.

Ten immense logs, the largest ever cut in the forests near Tacoma, were taken from the Port Blakeley mill last week and shipped to Chicago to go into the Washington world's fair building. Each log is 122 feet long and 42 inches across at the small end. Every two logs require seven cars, thirty-five cars in all being required for ten logs. One hundred and twenty-six logs will be required for the foundation of the Washington building.

The 21st day of October has been designated by the president as Columbus Day, to be celebrated by all the schools of the country in honor of the four hundredth anniversary of the discovery of America. We trust the schools of Columbia county will make arrangements for the proper celebration of the day.

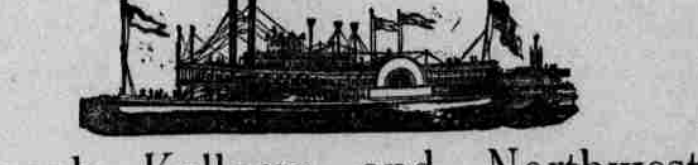
