THE DEMOCRATIC JOB.

The substitution of the name of Nathan Pierce by the state democratic central committee for that of R. A. Miller on the electoral ticket is one of the greatest deceptions ever known in Oregon politics.

In strict accordance with the above provision the republican clerks of the state have had the ballots printed, while the democratic clerks have violated this section of the law and caused Pierce's name to appear twice on each ballot.

Owing to the fact that in many counties the ballots had already been printed before this change was made by the democrats, it has been necessary to have the ballots reprinted, at a cost of from \$15,000 to \$20,000 to the state, and Columbia county suffers its proportion of this uncalled for expense.

THEY DIDN'T HELP SAVE IT.

There is one thing, says the Chicago Tribune, which sticks in the throats of old "vets" who were democrats that they cannot get over, but keeps in their minds and they are unable to forget it, and their sons are thinking of it—viz.: That Grover Cleveland and Adlai Stevenson, both large, strong, able-bodied men, refused to volunteer to help save the Union, but hung back and acted politically with the copperhead party of those days.

A DEMOCRAT'S IDEA OF POLITICS

At democratic headquarters in Portland Tuesday there was a big and excited crowd during the evening and far into the night, says the Oregonian.

"The situation, gentlemen, is just this; we cannot help Grover by voting for him, but we can hurt Harrison by voting for someone else. Now, to beat the republican party I would vote for the blindest nigger ever born—aye, I would even vote for Mrs. Lesse. I am a democrat and have no use whatever for the populists, but if we can use them to beat Harrison, let us use them."

MR. FACING-BOTH-WAYS.

Mr. Nathan Pierce, the populist candidate for presidential elector, who does not decline the democratic nomination "as elector for Cleveland and Stevenson," is the great Mr. Facing-Both-Ways of the Umattilla tribe in this campaign.

The chances are that Pierce's name will be scratched, as it ought to be, both by the peoples party and the democrats, as a rebuke to this attempt to sacrifice principle to personal ambition for success.

There seems to be a discrepancy between these apostles of the great and good peoples party. Mr. R. S. Hattan seems to be calling into question Mr. Wood's standing for truth and veracity, and it looks as though there might be a chance of their getting "mixed up" with each other.

As to the statement that a complaint was made against Mr. Wood before the grand jury, the editor of the Mier never filed nor investigated any such complaint to be filed. Whatever investigation may have been made by the grand jury was not upon the solicitation of the editor of this paper.

Yet Mr. Pierce and his populist confederates assert by their inaction that he is justified in claiming third-party support while allowing himself to remain a democratic nominee.

At republican state headquarters there is constant receipt of proof that the democratic adoption of Pierce, and his continued silence on the subject, is playing havoc with the populist strength.

The London Spectator, commenting on the political situation in the United States, and speculating on the result of the presidential campaign, says: "A republican victory in the coming election would retard for a long time the progress of the commercial doctrines that underlie the commercial greatness of Great Britain and alone maintain British ascendancy."

THE democrats are rattled. The national committee has ordered the state central committee to withdraw the remaining democratic candidates for electors and throw the democratic vote to the populist candidates.
