

LOCAL AND GENERAL.

Everybody and his wife should attend the school entertainment on the evening of the 24th inst.

Next Thursday is Thanksgiving day. Turkey and cranberry sauce will be the general order of things in—Portland.

We are informed that Hon. G. W. McBride has made arrangements for the clearing of Park Place at Houlton.

The first ice of the season was on the ground Wednesday morning, yet aryanthioniums are still in bloom in St. Helens.

The latest newspaper venture in Oregon is the Monmouth Tribune, published at Monmouth, Oregon, by Morin & Moore. Success, boys.

David Pope, who was so severely hurt in Brian's logging camp on Milton creek some time ago, is able to be about, much to the gratification of his friends.

Arthur Moore, son of Judge, F. A. Moore, formerly of this place but now of Salem, is convalescing from a severe attack of typhoid fever, and is now able to sit up.

The church at Houlton has received this week a fine chapel organ. This, together with the improvements that are being made on the church, will give the Houlton folks a most desirable place of worship.

Although the Italds is a small boat, she was greatly missed during the time she was laid up for repairs after her collision with the Ione. She resumed her regular trips last Saturday, and she seems in much better condition than before the collision.

Mrs. Klock, of Rainier, who has been suffering with cancer of the breast for the past four years, was operated on last Friday at the residence of Mrs. Dibblee by Drs. Belt, Cliff, Sims and McLaren, and up to the present time the patient is doing well, and a speedy recovery is anticipated.

The Union Pacific has withdrawn the Potter from the Astoria route and substituted the Hossalo instead. The reason given for this change is that the route does not pay the expense of running the large boat. But the substitution of this old tub will surely decrease the receipts as well as the expenses.

Moses Winthorn for some time has been missing some of his cattle. Three hides were found at the slaughterhouse of George Reynolds, of Weston, and the latter has been arrested. Reynolds was arrested a few weeks ago on a similar charge professed by Frank Beale. He was acquitted by showing that he had mistaken the identity of the beef slaughtered.

The Union Pacific steamer T. J. Potter, which has been on the Astoria route since early summer, was taken off Saturday night and sent to the "boneyard," where she will probably remain during the winter. The Hossalo left down Saturday night in her place. The time of leaving Portland has been changed from 11:30 to 8 o'clock in the evening. This change will be a great accommodation to the people of Columbia and Cowlitz counties.

A young man by the name of Faxon, living at Deer Island, was robbed of \$2 last Monday evening by a tramp. The tramp had been invited to ride with Faxon, and after going some distance he drew a revolver and demanded the dollar which he had seen Faxon have at the blacksmith shop just previous. There was nothing left for the young man to do except deliver up the coin, after which the footpad alighted and made tracks in the opposite direction.

Arrangements are now being made by which Columbia county warrants can be cashed at their face. Heretofore they have suffered a discount of from 2 to 10 per cent, which of course comes out of the holder, but also detracts wealth from the county, although not from the county funds direct, yet it comes from the individual, which is practically the same thing. This arrangement, when completed and in operation, will save the county hundreds of dollars each year, and is a very commendable act on the part of the county court.

Last Friday night the democrats of Washington county held a ratification meeting in Forest Grove. The procession marched through the streets headed by a brass band followed by about 200 torches. Some of the banners carried so aroused the indignation of some republican spectators that a shower of stale eggs was hurled at the participants, and a general riot was narrowly avoided. If this uncivilized act had been committed by small boys it could be overlooked. But we have it on good authority that it was men, grown men, who threw the tainted missiles. Such an occurrence is a disgrace to Forest Grove and Washington county.

The pupils of the St. Helens will give an entertainment and "basket supper" in Masonic hall on Thursday evening, November 24. The entertainment will be free, but the cost of the supper will be just what each basket brings when auctioned off. The money thus obtained is to pay for the flag which was raised at the school house on Columbus day. Professor Looney wishing to inspire his pupils with that patriotism and love of country, which cannot be too early infused into their education, secured the flag for this occasion. Its texture is of fine silk, its size 6x12 feet, and it was purchased in Portland at a cost of \$25. This flag will be raised over the school house on all occasions when the more important of our country's historical events are to be commemorated. The patrons of this school may justly feel proud of their flag, which is the finest in Columbia county, and second to but very few in the state. We trust that a purpose so commendable will receive the hearty co-operation and patronage of all.

This week we publish the official election returns for Columbia county as canvassed by the board last Saturday. Note the changes made since last week in Apriary precinct; also Pierce's vote in Marshland precinct, and a change in the totals. The official count also increases the total vote cast to 1543.

Official Proceedings of the November Term, 1892.

November 10.—Matter of rebate of tax of the Western Union telegraph company for year 1891. On this day comes C. F. Patterson, agent of the Western Union telegraph company, and presents to the court the claim that the said W. U. T. Co. had paid the sum of \$74.80 excess of taxes and ask a rebate for the year 1891 in the said sum of \$74.80, and the court being sufficiently advised in the matter, it is hereby ordered that the clerk of this court draw a warrant on the treasurer of Columbia county, Or., in the sum of \$74.80, payable to the order of the W. U. T. Co., as a rebate of tax for 1891.

In the matter of bridges across Tids and Spring creeks. This matter coming on to be heard, and it appearing to the satisfaction of the court that said bridges are now completed and the court being satisfied in the matter, said bridges are hereby accepted. It is therefore ordered by the court that the clerk draw a warrant in favor of A. F. McDonald on the county treasurer of Columbia county for the sum of \$65, in payment for work, etc., on said bridges, and in pursuance with a former order of this court.

In the matter of appointment and removal of road supervisors in the various road districts in Columbia county. On this day this matter came on to be heard, and the court being sufficiently advised at this time, it is hereby ordered and adjudged that any member of this court shall have the power and authority to remove a road supervisor for incompetency or neglect of duty, or removal from the district, and that any member of said court be and is hereby authorized to appoint a road supervisor to act in the place and stead of any one so removed, as above stated, and that such road supervisor act until the next regular term of this court thereafter, and at which time said appointment may then be rejected or confirmed by this court.

Matter of bridge work on county roads in Road District No. 5, Columbia county. On this day it appearing to the court that repairs are necessary on various bridges in Road District No. 5, it is hereby ordered by the court that A. F. McDonald, the road supervisor of said road district, be authorized to make such repairs as he may deem necessary on said bridges, the cost of which is not to exceed the sum of \$20, and that upon his certificate of such work to the clerk of this court, the clerk may draw a warrant in favor of said A. F. McDonald on the treasurer of this county not exceeding the said sum of \$20.

Matter of bill allowed A. F. McDonald. On this day comes A. F. McDonald and presents a bill for lumber furnished Road District No. 5, amounting to \$33.70, and this court being sufficiently advised in the matter, it is hereby ordered that said bill be allowed and the clerk of this court is ordered to draw a warrant on the county treasurer in favor of said A. F. McDonald for the sum of \$33.70.

Matter of petition of Chas. Wickstrom, et al, for a county road, commencing at 1/2 mile post on Goble road, thence east until intersecting with the Pope road, thence north until intersecting the Goble road. On this day this matter coming on to be heard, on the petition herein, and it appearing to the court that said petition is irregular in that the same does not come within the meaning of section 4072 of the general laws of Oregon. Therefore, it is hereby ordered by the court that said petition be and the same is hereby rejected.

Matter of insurance of county jail and courthouse. Now at this time it is ordered by the court that the courthouse of this county be insured in the sum of \$900, and the county jail of this county be insured in the sum of \$100, in the Farmers and Merchants insurance company, and upon receipt of the policy by the clerk of this court he draw a warrant on the treasurer of Columbia county in favor of said Farmers and Merchants insurance company for \$90 in payment for said policy.

Matter of appointment of C. F. Knowles justice of the peace for Nehalem precinct. On this day the petition of G. F. Lindgren, et al, for the appointment of a justice of the peace for Nehalem precinct came on to be heard, and the court being sufficiently advised at this time, it is therefore hereby ordered that C. F. Knowles be and he is hereby appointed justice of the peace for said Nehalem precinct, and that he qualify according to law and enter upon the discharge of his duties.

Matter of appointment of justice of the peace for Oak Point precinct. At this time came on to be heard the petition of C. W. Mayger et al, for the appointment of a justice of the peace

for Oak Point precinct, and the court being fully advised at this time, it is hereby ordered that Henry Henderson be and he is hereby appointed by the court, justice of the peace for Oak Point precinct, and that he qualify according to law and enter upon the discharge of his duties.

Matter of appointment of constable for Oak Point precinct. On this day came C. W. Mayger et al, praying the appointment of a constable in and for Oak Point precinct, and the court being fully advised in the matter, it is hereby ordered that Henry Henderson be and he is hereby appointed constable in and for Oak Point precinct, and that upon qualifying according to law he enter upon the discharge of his duties.

Matter of cost bill, State of Oregon vs. L. O. Baxter. On this day it is ordered by the court that the cost bill herein be allowed, as per transcript from J. P. court.

Matter of cost bill, State of Oregon vs. W. Burdick. On this day it is ordered by the court that the cost bill herein be allowed, as per transcript from J. P. court.

Matter of damages asked by S. R. Hagey, for \$150. On this day came on for hearing the petition of S. R. Hagey for damages by reason of the killing of a horse in an alleged defective county bridge, and the court being sufficiently advised in the matter, it is now considered and adjudged that said claim for damages be rejected and disallowed.
