Heating, Cooling and Ventilating. For more than twenty years the inventor of a new system for cooling, heating and ventilating has been developing the methods which have been embodied in his invention. His system consists of circulating fresh air through interior zigzag partitioned heating drums and coils arranged in a return zigzag flue extending from a suitable distance up the chimney, around which the escaping gases and smoke are made to pass. The heat that usually passes to waste outside the chimney is thus absorbed.

This heat is then turned into a stream of fresh, clean air, driven through heating apparatus and conveyed with great velocity through a circulating pipe into as many different buildings and apartments as may be desired. In this way a saving of from 70 to 90 per cent. in the cost of fuel is effected, and pure, wholesome air, which can be cooled if desired, can be obtained all over the house.—Pittsburg Dispatch.

Condensed Milk Lacks Water. Steam emanating from boiling milk if condensed would become water. This may be seen in the manufacture of condensed milk, which is only ordinary milk boiled down until the water is out of it. If a liquid which contains solid bodies in solution be evaporated, the solids are left behind. That this is so may be shown by adding to water that is to be distilled a trace of magenta, and a little salt. The distilled water has no taste and is colorless. The magenta is generally deposited upon the sides of the boiling vessel.—Brooklyn Eagle.

Derivations of Some Common Words. One remembers how on the 15th of June, 1215, King John signed the great charter of the constitutional freedom of Britain, and how, after he had signed it, he flung himself in a burst of fury on the floor and gnawed the straw and rushes with which the floors of those days were strewn. Now what was "charta"? Originally nothing more or less than a sheet of papyrus strips glued together as writing paper. So it is to the Egyptian reed that we owe our "charts," "charts," "cards," "cartes" (blanche and de visite), our "cartoons" and our "cartridges."—Good Words.

HATS OFF TO A TENDERFOOT.

The West Makes Due Acknowledgment to Mr. Payne from the East.

One by one the roses fade. The gentle tenderfoot from the distant east, whose doings in our western country have been a subject for ridicule, exaggeration and entertainment, suddenly turns the tables on his calculators. We have all heard of his listening wide mouthed to the startling stories concocted by the wild westerner; of his being made to dance to the music of the fretful six shooter; of the innumerable jokes of which he has been made the butt; of the joshing and joking he has ever been subjected to; of the ridiculous appearance he has made in the presence of the cowboys, the brawny miner and the breezy denizens of the boundless prairie. Always a guy, usually a coward and generally a nervous dude, the tenderfoot from east of the Mississippi has been the plaything and the shuttlecock of our worthy and self-reliant citizens.

But suddenly all this is changed, and the tenderfoot blossoms out to be "as mild a mannered man as ever scuttled ship or cut a throat." Shortly after the witching hour of midnight a train was held up on the Union Pacific, between this city and Cheyenne. Three masked robbers, looking like the heavy villains in the fourth act of the average melodrama, suddenly entered the coaches with glittering pistols cocked, and hoarsely demanded that every passenger hold up his hands. The train was filled with cowboys, Indians, typical westerners and blooded men from Montana. They glanced at the murderous guns of the robbers, listened to the fierce demand and sullenly obeyed. All but one poor, lone tenderfoot, from away back east, who instead of heeding the call of the thugs and thieves simply pulled his pistol and began, alone and steady handed, such a murderous, single and lively fire on the three masked holdups that one of them fell before the volley of cold lead, while his companions, amazed and mortified, picked him up and hastened from the scene.

Immediately following their departure the valiant cowboys, Indians and "bad men" from Butte became intensely brave, grabbed their pistols and talked loudly for an hour or so about following the scoundrels and hanging them to the nearest tree. Meanwhile of course the holdups escaped into the mountains, doubtless very wrath at the white faced youth from the east who had wounded unto death one of their fellows and prevented one of the nearest and richest robberies of the age, it being understood that several of the passengers had with them what is known as "the stuff."

We rather regret that the action of Mr. Payne crushes to earth an idol we long have cherished. That he alone and single handed should scatter the wild western robbers, while his terrified fellow passengers got under the seats and dodged out of sight of murderous muzzles, sets at defiance our preconceived notion of the genus tenderfoot. He is clearly an iconoclast. He violates all western tradition. If he or his kind repeats the instance related many more times, we shall begin to cherish a sneaking regard for the hopeful and brainy young fellow who comes out to our Rocky mountain region in search of fame and fortune, and glance somewhat askance at the loud voiced, leather breeched and jaunty native who alleges that he keeps his own private graveyard, but who is frequently behind a tree when the bullets are thickest.—Colorado Sun.

Children in the Caucasus Mountains. Among the wild tribes of the Caucasus every child is taught to use the dagger almost as soon as he can walk. They first learn to stab water without making a splash, and by practice acquire an extraordinary command over the weapon. Their pistols are fintlocks, with long, very thin barrels, and must have been handed down for generations. They do not look very formidable. The rows of little pouches worn across the breast do not contain cartridges, but small wooden cases tipped with bone or metal, and formerly used for carrying loose charges of powder and shot; now they are only worn for ornament. All the men speak a little Russian, but their own language is more allied to Armenian. They belong to the orthodox church.—London Saturday Review.

When Birds Face the Wind. The aboreal sparrow, vireos and many other smaller birds usually sit upon nests built on horizontal limbs, with the head from the trunk, and when the nest is much elevated the position is usually chosen so that the sifter will face the prevailing wind. Birds will nearly always, when on or off the nest, face the wind, and if observations are taken nearly all positions on the nest will be found in one position if a strong wind is blowing.—Science.
