Jacob George of the St. Helens hotel, is doing the preliminary work preparatory to building a new barn. The building will be 28x32 feet with sheds on either side in addition. This is done principally to accommodate his guests from the country who happen to be in town over night. The annual city election in St. Helens will take place on Monday, April 3, 1893, between the hours of seven and eight o'clock p. m. The machinery for the water works in St. Helens arrived yesterday from Portland, and Messrs. Orchard and Jones have commenced the construction of the plant, which will be pushed along as fast as possible until completed. Charles Mordman has filed a suit in the state circuit court in Multnomah county against the Joseph Kellogg Transportation Company for \$10,000 damages for injuries received while in the defendant's employ. On August 27, so the complaint alleges, the plaintiff was engaged as a deckhand on the steamer Joseph Kellogg. A landing was made at Jones' wharf at Scappoose, and Mordman was ordered to carry merchandise from the steamer to the dock. While doing so a rotten plank on the wharf gave way and he was thrown to the ground and severely injured and was confined in a hospital for two months. Editor Bathom, of the Astorian, was tried in the circuit court at Astoria last week for libeling Sidney Dell, an alleged lawyer, and discharged. Libel suits are like water—free. People should know better than to commence libel proceedings against a newspaper for publishing the truth about them. Indeed the newspaper's true mission is to show up all frauds that the people may not be imposed upon by that class of bullies which have no character, hence could not be libeled. DELENA.

Weather the past week has been rather unsettled, as we have had snow, rain and sunshine, all in one day. Stock of all kinds look well after the hard winter, which speaks well for the farmers in Beaver valley. Grass is very slow to start but the late spring will be better for fruit of all kinds, as it will prevent the buds from starting until the frosty weather has past, which is so destructive to fruit. Our roads are still in a deplorable condition and some immediate action should be taken to improve them, either by planking or otherwise, as the law gives the right to issue bonds for the construction of roads, payable ten or twenty years hence. Why not have a plank road from Rainier to Clatskanie, by way of Delena? This could be done at a moderate cost and would be of great benefit to the entire lower end of the county. A good road that could be used all the year round would greatly increase the value of property, besides more than compensating for the cost of construction in the way of increased business and comfort we would enjoy compared with our present, almost impassable, roads. Certainly every property owner along the line would be willing to pay his small tax towards building such a public highway, for he will readily see it is building up his own interests faster than could possibly be done without it. Where we now can haul our produce to market not more than four miles in the year, at least, we could then haul hay, pots, oes, lumber and shingles to market, and bring in other necessities of life at any time in the year when the market is best suited. Let us hope "the ball will be kept rolling" until a road has been built that could be used at all times of the year. Rev. COUNTY COURT.

Proceedings of the March Term, 1893.

In the matter of the change in the Pittsburg and Vernonia county road. Now on this day this matter coming on regularly to be heard, and it appearing to the court that the viewers and surveyor heretofore appointed to view out and survey said road, had failed to meet at the time and place appointed by the court, and more than five having elapsed since said appointed time of meeting of said viewers and surveyor, it is therefore ordered by the court that J. M. Maynard, D. F. Baker and T. L. Adams, three disinterested householders, be and they are hereby appointed viewers to view, mark, locate and lay out said proposed change in said county road, and that A. B. Little, a skillful surveyor, be and he is hereby appointed by the court to survey said proposed change; it is further ordered by the court that said viewers meet on the 12th day of April, 1893, at the house of D. F. Baker, at 8 o'clock of said day, and that they make a report of their doing herein on or before the next regular term of court, to be held May 3, 1893.

In the matter of the change in the county road known as the Goble county road. Now on this day this matter coming on regularly to be heard, and on motion of Messrs. Dillard & Cole, attorneys for petitioners, it is ordered and adjudged by the court that this be and the same is hereby continued until the next regular term of this court.

In the matter of the application of E. B. Elliott and others, for county road commencing at the three-mile stake on the county road leading from Marshland to the city of Clatskanie; thence in a northeasterly course to and terminating at the city of Clatskanie. Now on this day comes E. B. Elliott et al., by W. H. Conyers, their attorney, and presents to the court a petition signed by himself and thirty-eight others, praying for the establishment of a county road as follows: Commencing at the three-mile stake on the county road leading from Marshland, in Columbia county, State of Oregon, to the city of Clatskanie in said county and state, running thence in an easterly direction to the most practicable route to a stake marked "I"; thence in a southeasterly direction on the most practicable route to a stake marked "H." Said stake is at the intersection of the line between the land of John Leonard and Daniel Dixon in section 12, township 7 north, range 5 west; thence east across the land of John Leonard and Daniel Dixon on the most practicable route to the southwest corner of the land owned by Mrs. Leon A. Elliott to a stake marked "G" in section 7, township 7 north, range 4 west; thence in a southeasterly direction on the most practicable route to a stake marked "F" on the land of John M. Payne in section 7, township 7 north, range 4 west of the Willamette Meridian; thence in a northeasterly direction on the most practicable route to a stake marked "E" on the land of John M. Payne; thence in an easterly direction on the most practicable route to a stake marked "D" on the land of G. W. Badger in section 7, township 7 north, range 4 west; thence in a northeasterly direction on the most practicable route to a stake marked "C" on the land of G. W. Badger; thence following an old private road across the land of G. W. Badger and Charles Bureau to a stake marked "A" at a point where the county road leading from Marshland to the city of Clatskanie crosses the northern boundary line of the city of Clatskanie in section 8, township 7 north, range 4 west of the Willamette Meridian. And it appearing to the court that said petition and notices were signed by twelve or more householders of Columbia county, Oregon, residing in the vicinity of said proposed county road, and that said petition and notices described the beginning, intermediate points and terminus of said proposed county road with reasonable certainty, and it also appearing to the court by affidavit of E. B. Elliott and E. E. Quick, that said notices had been posted as required by law at follows: on the 1st and 24th days of February, 1893, one on a cedar stump about 90 feet from the land of John Leonard about 200 feet from the stake described in said road petition as marked "H" and one on what is known as the China Wash House about 150 feet from the terminal stake of said proposed road, and on the 21st day of January, 1893, one on the courthouse door in the town of St. Helens in said county and state. That all of said notices were posted in public places within said county and state, and that three of said notices were posted in the vicinity of said proposed road; that all of said notices were posted more than thirty days prior to the presentation of the said petition to the county court as required by law; and that the sum of \$150 to cover all expenses in case of appeal is made in opening said proposed road. It is therefore now ordered and adjudged by the court that S. M. Graham, W. E. Conyers and Henry Colvin, three disinterested householders, be and they are hereby appointed viewers of said proposed county road, and that A. B. Little, a skillful surveyor, be and he is hereby appointed surveyor to survey the same. It is further ordered by the court that said viewers and surveyor meet at the residence of Antoine Gundersen on the 22d day of March, 1893, and failing to meet on that day then within five days thereafter, and after being duly sworn view, lay out, survey and mark out said proposed road, and make report of the same to this court it writing on or before the first Wednesday in May.

In the matter of the appointment of a road supervisor for road district No. 5. Now on this day this matter coming on to be heard, and it appearing to the court that there was no acting and legally appointed road supervisor in said road district No. 5; it is ordered by the court that Isaac S. Bumgardner be and he is hereby appointed road supervisor of road district No. 5 for the next ensuing year. In the matter of the appointment of a road supervisor for road district No. 10. Now on this day this matter coming on to be heard, and it appearing to the court that the regular appointed road supervisor in said district No. 10 had failed to qualify, and in pursuance of a former order of court, Commissioner Barnes had appointed W. J. Webber to fill said vacancy, and the court being fully advised in the matter it is therefore ordered and adjudged by the court that said appointment of W. J. Webber be and the same is hereby confirmed by the court.

In the matter of the report of Magnus Saxon of delinquent road tax in road district No. 3. Now on this day comes Magnus Saxon, ex-road supervisor of road district No. 3, and files his report of the delinquent tax collected in said road district, and that \$21.95 had been collected on said delinquent list and turned over to his successor, it is therefore ordered by the court that said report be and the same is hereby accepted.

In the matter of the return of the delinquent tax list for the year 1892. Now on this day comes G. A. Massie, sheriff of Columbia county, Oregon, and asks the court to extend the time for returning the delinquent tax roll of 1892, and the court being fully advised in the matter, it is therefore now ordered and adjudged by the court that the time for the return of the delinquent tax roll for 1892 be and the same is hereby extended until the 3rd day of May, 1893.

In the matter of bids for taking care of the paupers of Columbia county. Now on this day this matter coming on regularly to be heard, and it appearing to the court that in their opinion it would be a saving to the county to let the keeping and care of the paupers of Columbia county, Oregon, to the lowest responsible bidder, it is therefore ordered by the court that the county judge be and he is hereby authorized to advertise for bids for the keeping and care of the paupers of Columbia county, Oregon; said bids to be opened at the next regular term of the county court, to be held on May 3, 1893, the county clerk reserving the right to reject any and all bids.

In the matter of the report of the road supervisor of road district No. 21. Now on this day comes John Veasey, road supervisor of road district No. 21 and presents to the court his report for the year 1892, and it appearing to the court that the said John Veasey had been unable to report at the January term of court as required by law, it is therefore ordered that said report be and the same is hereby accepted as filed, and it is further ordered that the clerk draw a warrant on the county treasurer in favor of the said John Veasey in the sum of \$970 and that said district be credited with the sum of \$10.30.

In the matter of the official bond of G. A. Massie, sheriff of Columbia county, Oregon. Now on this day this matter coming on to be heard, and it appearing to the court that one of the bondsmen on the original bond of G. A. Massie had died, and it also appearing to the court that a new and ample bond had been filed in this court as by law required by the said G. A. Massie, sheriff, it is therefore now ordered and adjudged by the court that said bond be and the same is hereby accepted by the court, and it is further ordered that said bond be placed on record.

In the matter of error in boundary of road districts Nos. 9 and 10. On this day this matter coming on regularly to be heard, and it appearing to the court that in making the boundaries of road districts No. 9 and 10 on the map there had been an error made and that sections 10, 11 and 12 properly belonged in road district No. 9, as per order of court, but had inadvertently been placed in road district No. 10. It is therefore ordered by the court that the clerk correct the map and record to correspond with the order and intent of the court.

In the matter of the establishment of road survey No. 84, known as the R. Kappler road, and beginning on road survey No. 56 at a stake marked "A. No. 1" at intersection of Saulser road with the Wash Muckle road in section 1, township 4 north, range 2 west; thence in a westerly course to a stake marked "B. No. 2," 80 rods north of southeast corner of section 2, township 4 north, range 2 west; thence south to and terminating at the southeast corner of said section 2 in said town and range last above mentioned. On this day this matter coming on to be heard upon the second reading of the report of the viewers and it appearing to the court that said viewers and surveyor had met at the time and place appointed, and after being duly sworn, viewed, surveyed, marked and located a county road as follows, forty feet in width: Beginning on road survey No. 56, known as the Saulser road at a stake marked "A. No. 1" at the intersection of what is known as the Wash Muckle road; thence in a westerly direction on the most practicable route to a stake marked "B. No. 2," 80 rods north of the southeast corner of section 2 in township 4 north of range 2 west of the Willamette Meridian; thence south to the southeast corner of said section 2 to a stake marked "No. 3," said township and range. Said viewers having made their report in writing in favor of the establishment of said proposed county road, which report, together with the surveyor's field notes and plat of the survey, had been delivered to the county clerk by one of the viewers on or before the third day of the term of this court next ensuing the appointment of said viewers and surveyor, and said report having been read in open court on two different days of said court, and there being no remonstrance or bill of damages filed and the court being fully advised in the matter at this time, it is therefore considered and ordered that said report of viewers, surveyor's field notes and plat be recorded and said route so viewed, surveyed, marked and located shall be a county road and the same considered a public highway, and the supervisor of the road district in which said road is established is hereby ordered to open the same.
