

The anti-Chinese demonstration in Portland a few days ago was simply an expression of the sentiment entertained by the people in regard to the Chinese immigration laws and the way in which they are being systematically defied and violated and contemptuously ignored.

There are one hundred and twenty newspapers and magazines published in Tokyo, the most important, from the standpoint of circulation, being the Asahi Shimbun, or Morning News, Asahi meaning morning and Shimbun meaning news.

From the meager reports received it is impossible to place the responsibility but it would seem that there is some body radically to blame. In some unaccountable way the Victoria was rammed by her sister ship the Campdown, and so badly disabled that she went to the bottom in a few minutes.

Discussed the recent pension legislation, a California lawyer, in Washington on a pleasure trip, said: "If I were one of the pensioners dropped by reason of the reversal of the construction placed upon the 'Disability not of service origin' clause of the act of 1890 by Gen. Raum and ex-Secretary Noble, I should appeal to the courts for the proper construction of that law.

Representative Caruth, of Kentucky, is one of the democrats who believes that Mr. Cleveland may again be the presidential candidate of his party. When some gentlemen were discussing the availability of Gov. Flower, of New York, and several western men Mr. Caruth after expressing his opinion as to the probable candidate remarked significantly: "All this, I want to add, is on the presumption, of course, that Mr. Cleveland will not consent to allow his name to be presented for a third term."

Of course nothing can restore the lives of those who were killed in the accident at Ford's theatre, but it is a satisfaction to the families of the victims to know that as far as a coroner's jury can do it the responsibility for the wholesale murder has been placed upon Col. Ainsworth, chief of the records and pensions division of the war department, who was in charge of the building; G. W. Dant, the contractor who made the excavation which was the direct cause of the falling of the floor; W. E. Covert and F. Sasse, superintendent and engineer respectively of the wrecked building, each of whom is now under \$10,000 bail to await the action of the grand jury.

The Republicans of Ohio honored themselves by honoring Hon. William McKinley with a nomination for reelection as governor of the state. He is one of the most highly respected republicans in the country and well worthy of the honors conferred upon him.

FARGO, North Dakota, was well-nigh ruined by fire Wednesday night. Practically half the city was burned, three thousand persons are homeless, and the loss to property will reach fully three million dollars. The city will not readily recover from the blow.

COMMENTING on Gov. Altgeld's unprecedented action in pardoning the Haymarket murderers, the Oregonian, with just indignation says: "The democratic governor of Illinois has pardoned the imprisoned anarchists, thus fulfilling the pledge to their friends and sympathizers, by which he gained considerable support last November. This scandalous defeat of public justice is one of the results of the democratic victory in Illinois. It was notorious before the election that Altgeld has promised to turn these miscreants loose upon society. That is what piled up the enormous majority in Chicago for the democratic ticket. Altgeld was elected by the votes of alien thugs, assassins and dynamiters upon assurance that he would release their bloody-minded and bloody-handed associates from confinement to which mistaken judicial clemency had condemned them, in place of the death they deserved. This is a most shameful episode in American history, and however the turbulent classes may triumph over it at present, its most fatal reaction will be upon their kind. The next jury that has to deal with an anarchist assassin, will take pains to put him out of reach of the corrupt Clemency of a conscienceless demagogue."

SENATOR MITCHELL and Senators Teller of Colorado, and Stewart of Nevada, have been appointed a committee to present in congress the free-coinage resolutions adopted by the Trans-Mississippi congress at their late session in Ogden. Senator Stewart is to be chairman of the committee and his well-known ability and free-silver principles will give considerable weight and influence to the resolutions of the Ogden congress.

PAYMASTER JOHN C. SULLIVAN, of the navy, who received a lot of unenviable notoriety and narrowly escaped being court-martialed for criticizing the action of the Harrison administration in dealing with Canadian poachers in Behring Sea, is now to be tried by a court martial upon a more serious charge—embezzling \$12,000 of government funds.
