In week party that will cause many a cramp the aggregate, this form of indebtedness reaches the enormous sum of \$4,935,455,896, of which \$1,486,272,270 is on farm lands, and \$8,249,183,614 is on city and town property. That is to say, of the total amount, only a little over one-fourth rests upon the rural population. This will surprise those who know nothing about the matter except for which the state senate could not make a ticket that will win what has been told them by populist orators and newspapers. 


