A Few More Pardons.—SALEM, Aug. 22.—Governor Penney today issued full pardons to the following prisoners in the penitentiary: R. J. Harris, convicted in Union county, July 2, 1892, of assault and robbery, and sentenced for five years. The reasons given for the pardon are: "His family is in need of his services, and he has been sufficiently punished." Frank O'Neil, convicted in Lane county, June 10, 1894, of assault with a dangerous weapon, and sentenced for six months. The reason given is that the sentencing judge recommended the pardon. Zezo Denny, convicted in Union county, March 10, 1894, of larceny, and sentenced for two years. The reason given is that the district attorney recommended the pardon.

The governor has appointed William Patterson, of Pendleton, a delegate to represent Oregon at the third national irrigation convention to be held at Denver, Sept. 3d.
