WHILE we are experiencing rather wintry weather we are on the lucky side of the country after all.

THIS is the first time since 1879 New York has had a republican governor.

THE total taxable property of Columbia county as returned by the county assessor was \$1,558,946.

THE United States has five ambassadors abroad, namely, Bayard, Eastie, Runyon, MacVeagh and Breckinridge.

IN the annual report of the state railroad commission we find the following: "Much more has been accomplished during the last two years than could have been done, had not the unprecedented wave of business depression swept over the state and country generally."

REPRESENTATIVE YATES, of Washington county, has a bill prepared which he will introduce into the legislature, which provides that sections 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6, township 3 north, range 4 west, and sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 7, township 3 north, range 5 west, be cut off from Columbia and given to Washington county.

THE present statute prevents the fishermen on the lower and middle Columbia from taking the salmon in the spring when they bring the highest price, and when, on account of no spawning, there is no need of protection.

THE only reasonable conclusion that can be drawn is that the present law was enacted through influence brought to bear by those desiring to catch on the upper river all the salmon that are running during the spring close season, immediately upon the opening of the spring catching time.

THE senators and representatives from the lower river will be personally requested to use their best endeavors to secure to the fisherman his rights and the legislature should listen to those desiring to be heard before passing the bills introduced at this session.

NOT Liable For The Tax Collection Shortage of ex-Sheriff Massie. Judge Shattuck on Wednesday of this week decided the suit of Columbia county vs G. A. Massie, ex-sheriff, and his bondsmen, in favor of the bondsmen.

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MORE INDEPENDENT THOUGHT.

There are a few people in the State of Oregon who are so narrow in their views as to assert that, aside from themselves, Senator Dolph is the only republican in the state; and that all those who oppose his perpetuation in office, whether on the ground of finance or land grants, are populists.

THE men connected with the anti-Dolph movement, a majority of whom have been fighting the battles for the republican party and for republican principles all these years, are populists, then the republicans have greatly decreased in number.

THE most shallow and frivolous type of the republican party is progressive and always has been. While, of course, some of its members are slow to comprehend new conditions or to grasp new ideas or to grapple with new issues, the rank and file are marching onward in a progressive way.

THE day the republican party is a unit, but there appear questions of lesser importance in which individual opinions differ and independent thought and action comes to the surface, yet in the main are concurrent with the general plan of republicanism.

NO party, sect or creed has the right or can consistently set up a code of varied principles and say to its members, you must conform to each and everyone of these to be with us in good faith.

HE who would assert that "if you do not think just as I do you are a hypocrite," is only making an exhibit of the narrowness of his intellect.

PEOPLE, especially republicans, are taught the right and it is their duty to think for themselves, think as they please, the wail of the "holier than thou" contingent to the contrary notwithstanding.

PROTECT THE FISHING INDUSTRY. A MEETING of Columbia river fishermen was held at the courthouse at St. Helens Wednesday evening, and was largely attended.

THE object of the meeting was to discuss ways and means to secure the best possible legislation for the protection of the salmon industry, and by united action to pass such a law as will give to the gill net fishermen an equal show with the canneries, and those on the upper river using traps, wheels and other devices.

AFTER permanent organization and various speeches, resolutions to be sent to the present legislative assembly, were adopted, providing for the abolition of the spring close season, and making the fall close season extend from August 15 to October 15, the reasons given being that the salmon do not spawn at all during the spring, and need the greatest protection in the fall when the actual spawning takes place.

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COMMISSIONERS' COURT.

The Important Business Transacted at the Regular January Term.

BE it remembered that at a regular term of the county court of the state of Oregon for the county of Columbia, begun and held at the county courthouse, in St. Helens, in said county and state, on Wednesday, January 9, 1895. The same being Wednesday after the first Monday in said month, and the time fixed by law for the holding a regular term of said court.

Present, Hon. Dean Blanchard, Judge S. F. Schoonover, commissioner, F. A. Frakes, commissioner, Judson Weed, clerk, and C. F. Doan, sheriff.

Due proclamation being made the following proceedings were had:

On the matter of petition of C. May and others, for county road. Petition granted, and Walter Colvin, Ed Elliott and Charles Graham, Jr., appointed viewers, and W. N. Meserve, surveyor, to meet at the residence of Sam Harris, on February 8th, 1895, at 8 o'clock A. M.

In the matter of the petition of John Nelson and others, for county road. Petition granted, and Dan Rice, William Barr, and William Holsapple, appointed viewers, and W. N. Meserve, surveyor, to meet at the residence of W. H. Kyser on February 6th, 1895, at 8 o'clock A. M.

In the matter of the collection of road taxes. It is ordered that the road supervisors of the several districts, at the time of making their reports, turn over to the sheriff a list of all delinquent road tax, who shall collect the same in the same manner and at the time he collects other taxes.

In the matter of compensation of road supervisors. It is ordered that supervisors of roads will not be allowed compensation for more than one day for each six days reported worked in his district.

In the matter of selecting jury list for 1895. The court selected from the assessment roll for 1894, 200 names to serve as jurors for 1895.

In the matter of the report of C. H. Newell, supervisor of road district No. 4. Report examined and approved.

In the matter of rebate of tax on the east 1/2 of northwest 1/4 of section 13, township 5 north, range 3 west. It is ordered that said land was doubly assessed. It is ordered that the clerk draw a warrant in the sum of \$6.12 in favor of the Commercial National Bank.

In the matter of additional bond of sheriff. It is ordered that the sheriff be required to give an additional bond of \$10,000 as tax collector.

In the matter of the sale of land belonging to Martin Harvey for delinquent taxes. It appearing to the court that said sale was illegal. It is ordered that said sale be cancelled.

In the matter of settlement with the various county officers. The accounts of the clerk, sheriff, and treasurer were examined and found correct, and ordered approved.

In the matter of the county printing. It is ordered that the county printing be given to THE OREGON MIST for the year 1895 on the same terms as for the year 1894.

In the matter of taking material for roads. It is ordered that no supervisor take material outside the limit of the road without permission of the owners of the premises.

OREGON'S LEGISLATURE.

The Eighteenth Session Organized - J. N. Dolph Caucus Nominee for U. S. Senator.

The eighteenth biennial session of the Oregon legislature convened at Salem Monday, Joseph Simon, of Multnomah, was elected president of the senate and C. B. Moores of Marion speaker of the house.

AFTER the organization of the two houses the oath of office was administered by the new state officers, consisting of Governor Lord, Secretary of State Kincaid, Treasurer Metcalf, Superintendent of Public Instruction Irwin, State Printer Leeds and Attorney-General Idleman.

AFTER the appointment of standing committees by the two houses they proceeded with routine business, with the spirit of reform prevailing on every hand. Clerk hire in many instances was reduced from former sessions and the number of clerks was also reduced.

SENATE. The following bills were read the first time: By McGinn, regulating the salaries of Multnomah county officials; by Bancroft, of Multnomah, providing for the issuance of bonds for laying and repairing of sewers; by Smith, of Sherman, an act pertaining to the right of cities and towns to public lands, parks and streets; by McClung, of Lane, relating to the bidding in of property sold for taxes and assessments.

By Woodard, of Multnomah, relating to the practice of medicine; by Patterson, of Marion, pertaining to the crimes of rape and incest, and providing penalty therefor; by Johnson, of Linn, to exempt from taxation county roads and public highways; by Dawson, of Linn, providing for the deduction of indebtedness from taxation; by King of Baker, providing for payment of taxes in lawful money; by McGinn, of Multnomah, regulating banks and providing for appointment of state bank examiner; by Patterson, of Marion, providing for mileage of members of the legislature; by Cogswell, of Lake, pertaining to the transfer of mortgages.

Bancroft, of Multnomah, to prevent the disposition of firearms to minors under 16; first reading. Brownell, of Clackamas, to amend the act creating the railroad commission and abolishing said commission. Gowen, of Harney, creating the sixth judicial district, embracing the counties of Grant, Harney and Malheur.

Maxwell, of Tillamook, to relieve Tillamook county of the payment of certain taxes due to the state; regulating the improvement of roads in Walla walla county. Dawson, of Linn, amending the code relative to the date of payment of state taxes.

Denny, of Multnomah, at the request of the State Bar Association, prescribing the residence of prosecuting attorneys, etc. Smith, of Clatsop, prohibiting the catching of salmon in fish wheels.

Raley, of Umatilla, to amend the act creating the state board of horticulture. Huston, of Washington, to amend the act incorporating Hillsboro.

McClung, of Lake, requiring banks to report quarterly to the secretary of state. McGinn, of Multnomah, amending the code relating to assessment and taxation.

King, of Baker, to amend the code relating to the redemption of county orders. McAllister, of Union, for the improvement of roads in Walla walla county. The senate then proceeded to the house to assist in the inauguration of Governor Lord, and upon its return adjourned, as a further mark of respect to ex-Governor Chadwick.

CAUCUS FAVORS DOLPH. A caucus of the republican members for United States Senator was held Wednesday night and out of the 72 republican votes Senator Dolph received 40. The vote stood as follows: Dolph 40, Fulton 12, Tongue 11, Lowell 4, Lord 2, Hermann 2, Strong 1. The two houses will meet in joint session next Tuesday and elect a senator. It requires 46 votes to elect.
