SIDE-HEAD PARAGRAPHS.

LEO BADLY INJURED.—Mr. Vandolah, who lives on Germany hill, met with a serious accident one day last week. While splitting wood the ax glanced and entered the leg below the knee, splitting the tibia bone in a fearful manner. Dr. Cliff was summoned and found it necessary to take out several pieces of the fractured bone.

IN THE PROBATE COURT.—In Judge Blanchard's court Tuesday suit was brought by N. A. Perry against Lindley Meeker, administrator of the estate of Levi French, to recover the sum of \$175 for attendance on French during his sickness. Judge Blanchard took the matter under advisement until Wednesday, when he decided that plaintiff was entitled to the amount claimed.

THE OREGON BLUE BOOK.—Mr. H. G. Mathies, of Portland, publisher of "The Oregon Blue Book," has our thanks for a copy of that valuable encyclopedia of information. The work is illustrated throughout, containing splendid portraits and biographical sketches of the members of the late legislature, state officers and United States senators. The book as one of reference is of inestimable value to persons interested in public and especially political affairs, and reflects credit upon its author.

STUCK IN RICH.—A report from Union says: "Last Thursday night a large cave took place on Sturgill bar, where Captain Robinson was in charge of the nozzle, and an examination showed nuggets of all shapes and sizes. The workmen quickly picked up \$14,500 in gold, in dinner pails, and many thousands of dollars more are actually in sight. Everybody in this section is now looking for high bars and coarse gold channels on Snake river, and the most intense excitement prevails among the prospectors."

A COLUMBIA-RIVER HATCHERY.—There is to be a salmon hatchery somewhere on the Columbia or one of its branches this season. Mr. McGuire has been soliciting subscriptions for this purpose, and has received some \$2000, but he is thrown in the shade by the cannerymen. Mr. J. O. Hawthorn says the cannerymen have quietly put up \$7000 toward a hatchery. The dam in the Clatskanie has spoiled the hatchery business there. The owner offers to allow Mr. McGuire to put a fish ladder in at a place where it would be no good if he gives bonds that it will do no harm. Just where the new hatchery is to be located has not been decided.

CITY COUNCIL MEETING.—The city council held an adjourned meeting Tuesday night, at which time the contract was awarded to John Gilmore for furnishing the oil and lighting the street lamps for a period of one year for \$117.50, his being the lowest bid submitted. The ordinance committee and city recorder were authorized to draw up and report a fee bill at the next meeting providing legal fees to be charged by the marshal and recorder in performing their official duties. The question of supplying the city with better water was taken up and Mr. Orchard was given until next Monday night to submit a proposition to bring water from Perry creek.

THE COURT DID RIGHT.—The county court very wisely rejected the claim of Mary Pringle for \$500 damages, alleged to have been done an orchard by fire. The claimant alleged that the road supervisor in his official capacity, had set out fire which destroyed a part of the orchard belonging to said claimant. The bill has been pending before the court for several months and the commissioners made a personal investigation of the matter, and were convinced that the damage done did not exceed \$25; that the county is not liable for said damage; and lastly and finally, that the road supervisor did not set out the fire that destroyed the trees, hence the claim was rejected.

FOR BETTER WATER.—Messrs. Orchard & Jones, proprietors of the St. Helens water works, are making estimates on a proposition to enlarge the water plant of this city by putting in a gravity system and bringing water from Perry creek, about two and one-half miles from town. The proposition is only considered by these gentlemen in anticipation of also making satisfactory terms with the people of Houlton for supplying that town with the same system. St. Helens can afford to pay liberally for this water, which we believe would be conducive of better health and furnish water far more palatable. If these necessary arrangements can be made it is the intention to build another tank larger than the one now used, with an increased pressure for fire purposes.

A LITTLE PREMATURE.—The Clatskanie Chief man censures School Superintendent Watts because that gentleman does not act in the capacity of special correspondent for his paper, with special reference to the late school apportionment, and says all the papers in the county would be glad to publish those things free of charge if the county officers would supply them with copy. This Mist has been publishing these things free of charge for twelve years, and furnished Mr. Orchard with the records. The Chief also praises Mr. Weed for sending that paper a copy of the court proceedings, and threatens political annihilation to the officer who does not "stand in" with his royal Chiefship. We presume the county clerk has a perfect right to act as correspondent for the Chief or any other paper if he desires to do so. Brother, you are a little premature in your censures of Mr. Watts. That gentleman had nothing to do with the school apportionment appearing in these columns. If you want such news go to the records and get it the same as we do.

Miss Emma Wagner and the pupils of the public school, assisted by the citizens of Rainier, will give an entertainment in that city this (Friday) evening, with admission 10 cents.

Frank Bishop, supervisor of road district No. 6, has lately built three bridges on the Makinster road, one of them 170 feet, and another 90 feet and the other 30 feet, all made of cedar.

Owing to important business matters which required immediate attention, Hon. T. J. Cleston was unable to be present at the meeting of the republican club at Mayger last Saturday night.

Fishermen have been doing very well here for some days; better, perhaps, than at any other point along the river. There is money in salmon at 5 cents a pound, provided you can catch any.

Good many farmers have signed the roll for the formation of a promotional society. The petition can be seen at the postoffice, together with the proposed constitution and by-laws of the society.

The Borthwick mill, near Mooresville, is running with a crew of about forty men. The mill company are also repairing their wood and lumber flume, which is at present being used to run piling.

Rudolph Anliker, of Upper Tide Creek, met with a serious accident one day last week. While slashing a limb from a tall tree fell and struck Mr. Anliker on the back and shoulders. At last accounts he was able to be out.

At the meeting of the Thomas B. Reed republican club held at Houlton Monday evening, A. B. Little, J. B. Godfrey and T. J. Cleston were elected delegates to the meeting of the Young Men's Republican Club to be held in Portland May 23.

The steamer Mascot has lately been thoroughly overhauled, and is the fastest and most commodious daily steamer plying between St. Helens and Portland. Arrangements have been completed to make regular time from now on, and the patrons of the Mascot will be given more time in Portland than by any other daily steamer touching at St. Helens. Fare only 25 cents.

Mr. Orchard is meeting with a fair degree of success in securing right-of-way to bring water in from Perry creek to St. Helens. He expects, if necessary arrangements can be made in other directions, to build a tank with a capacity of 15,000 gallons along side of the present one. If these details can all be consummated Mr. Orchard proposes to reduce the price of water in the city.
