

Two Boys Drowned.—Anthony and Thomas, aged 15 and 13 years, respectively, sons of Casper Endres, were drowned in Moss lake, Clackamas county, one day last week. The lake is situated just below Oregon City, and the two boys were upon a raft crossing it. The raft began to tip on one side and the boys became frightened and jumped overboard.

CITY ELECTION.—The annual city election took place here Monday. The following persons were elected to fill the city offices for the ensuing year: President of the council, Jacob George; councilmen, C. H. Newell, Thomas Cooper, S. A. Miles, James Muckie; recorder, Harrison Allen; treasurer, E. E. Quick; marshal, A. Robinson. In the excitement of county and state politics the municipal election had almost been overlooked, but by Monday the clouds had partially cleared away and as the time approached for the polls to open interest grew deeper until there were three tickets in the field before the voting began. There were a few names that appeared on all the tickets, and of course those persons were elected, but some by small majorities. The contest, though exciting, passed off good naturedly.

CLOSE SEASON ENDED.—The spring close season for salmon ended last night. Notwithstanding that it is against the law to take salmon prior to April 10th, many men are believed to have been fishing right along and have been secretly marketing their catch. Some have gotten into trouble for this violation of law, but the majority have realized a neat sum for their labor, because there has been a good run of fish during the close season. The coming fishing season, however, promises to open with a strike, since the cannerymen refuse to pay the price demanded by the Fishermen's Union of 5 cents per pound. It is not thought a strike would be of long duration this year because the fishermen are anxious to earn a few dollars and the packers are equally anxious to have their canneries in operation to fill orders already contracted.

### DEMOCRATS IN CONVENTION

#### Last Saturday Nominated a County Ticket.

Delegates to the State Convention and a County Central Committee Were Also Chosen.  
The democratic county convention was held in this city last Saturday and was called to order promptly at 2 o'clock by C. S. Emerson, chairman of the central committee. Mr. Emerson was made temporary chairman and W. F. Slaughter temporary secretary.  
On motion of Thomas Cooper a committee of three was appointed on credentials, and the chair appointed Thomas Cooper, A. Stump and John Pringle.  
On motion of W. B. Dillard a committee of three was appointed on resolutions and order of business. The chair appointed W. B. Dillard, Edwin Merrill and C. W. Emerson.

At this point an adjournment of fifteen minutes was taken to give the credentials committee time to report, after which the credentials committee reported the following as entitled to seats in the convention: James Meeker, Amos Stevens, C. S. Emerson, John Scott, George Case, J. Turpin, David Henshaw, A. Robinson, George Moeck, J. S. Cloninger, E. H. Burnett, Henry Henderson, W. F. Slaughter, William Stevens, U. W. Clark, J. C. Johnson, F. M. Stevens, E. A. Emerson, George Grant, W. H. Dolman, W. B. Dillard, Thomas Cooper, C. W. Frush, A. Stump, C. W. Emerson, N. A. Perry, John Pringle, James Dart, Edwin Merrill, Joe Dupont, A. N. Clark, J. T. Walker, W. Meilinger, Frank Stevens.  
The committee appointed for that purpose reported the following order of business and resolutions:

ORDER OF BUSINESS.  
1st, nomination of judge; 2nd, nomination of sheriff; 3rd, we recommend that no nomination be made for clerk, as we desire the best men, and in the nomination of Judson Weed we consider the republican convention made a wise selection; 4th, representative; 5th, treasurer; 6th, assessor; 7th, commissioner; 8th, that we leave vacant, with power in the hands of the county committee, to fill in the offices of school superintendent and surveyor; 9th, a county central committee of five with power to appoint precinct committees to fill precinct tickets; 10th, election of three delegates to state convention with power in the hands of central committee to appoint one at large if so entitled. We recommend that the temporary officers be made the permanent officers of this convention.

RESOLUTIONS.  
We, the county democrats of Columbia county, Oregon, in convention assembled hereby resolve:  
"We admit that the financial question is a deep one and trust to the wisdom of our state and national conventions to deal with it in a wise and just manner."  
"We believe in the whole as a market for our surplus produce, and to that end are in favor of a liberal commerce with all nations and reciprocity with the whole world."  
"We believe that a public office is a public trust, and propose to nominate our best men, regardless of private wishes."  
"We deplore as much as at the public polls, and ask the aid of all good citizens in maintaining the purity of the ballot."  
"We can never sanction any law requiring an injured party to give bonds for costs prior to being heard to complain of a public crime before a magistrate of his country."  
"We are in favor of the fewest number of new laws consistent with public security and prosperity and the repeal of all useless ones now on our statutes."  
The above order of business and resolutions were unanimously adopted.  
At this juncture W. B. Dillard was called upon to address the convention, and for a time reviewed the history of the democratic party.

NOMINATIONS.  
The following nominations for county officers were made by acclamation: County Judge—James Dart, St. Helens. Sheriff—Edwin Merrill, of Deer Island. Representative—George F. Moeck, of Rainier.  
Treasurer—W. H. Dolman, of St. Helens. Commissioner—D. W. Freeman, of Fishhawk.  
Assessor—George Grant, of Scappoose.  
Coroner—J. S. Cloninger, of St. Helens.  
A county central committee of five was appointed as follows: W. B. Dillard, chairman; C. S. Emerson, John Pringle, J. C. Johnson and W. F. Slaughter.  
Delegates chosen to the state convention were: Henry Henderson, Amos Stevens and W. B. Dillard.  
On motion of W. B. Dolman the central committee was empowered to fill any vacancies that might occur on the ticket.  
John Pringle made a motion that each democrat contribute something, even if not more than a nickel, to the campaign fund. C. W. Emerson opposed the motion for the reason as he said, "There is not a democrat in the county who would have a nickel after paying his taxes."  
On motion of Mr. Dolman an assessment of \$5.00 was made on all candidates for campaign purposes.  
A. N. Clark was nominated for justice of the peace and John Scott for constable in Union precinct.  
A vote of thanks was tendered Chairman Emerson and Secretary Slaughter for their services. The convention then adjourned.
