MONDAY'S ELECTION.

The result of Monday's election proves conclusively that a republican omination does not always mean an election in Oregon. The result shows that in all parts of the state party lines have been broken and in many counties that gave one party a major ity two years ago gave the other party a majority this year. This condition has not resulted from a change of sentiment upon any of the heretofore well established party principles, but largely upon local issues and factional dif-

The great republican majority of two year a nomination meant an election. This, however, is a too common error, as was pointed out by THE MIST just prior to the convention. Indeed many times have parties gone down to defeat through overconfidence and this year is no exception. Conventions may apparently shape public sentiment for the time being, but the voters put the finishing touches to it on election day. In Multnomah county in particular party lines are in shreds, and a reorganization will be almost imperative. Other counties of the state are in like condition. The people have declared that they have something to say, and that their wishes are to receive at least some consideration, and if they do not receive it before they have learned to demand it at the ballet box.

In this county the vote on congress man assumed a peculiar phase, and as predicted before election, the votes for Northup only assisted toward the election of Quinn, taking votes from Ellis. Northup, however, is third man in the race. The probibition vote for congressman was over three times as large as ever before, not perhaps because there are any more prohibitionists in the county than formerly, but apparently because of a general dissatisfaction with the nomnees of the other parties. The votes for Northup were probably not all because of a personal antagonism or dislike for Mr. Ellis so much as a disapmore clearly shown by the vote for Norman Merrill for representative and George W. Patterson for joint senator, both pledged to support Senator Mitchell, whose views on the money question are identical with those of Mr. Ellis, Mr. Merrill and Mr. Patterson are each elected to the legislature and a vote for either was a vote for Mitchell, yet by the result Mitchell was supported and Ellis was opposed.

In Clackamas county where the republicans two years ago elected every man on the ticket has gone the reverse this year and the populists have made a clean sweep, again demonstrating that a nomination, unless judiciously made, does not mean an election. 

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
