OBITUARY.
Died—on the morning of April 28, 1896, at the residence of Mrs. Lydia Barnes, of Deer Island, Columbia county, Oregon, of Susannah Sigler was born on the 20th of March, 1800, in Shenandoah county, Virginia. Her parents were of German descent. In 1807 she removed (with her parents) to Ross county, Ohio. On April 23, 1823, she was married to Asbel Merrill, in Ross county, Ohio. In 1823, with her husband and two children, she emigrated to Peoria county, Illinois. Here the family lived and labored hard for many years, and was exposed to extreme danger on the frontier during the Blackhawk war. In 1847 the family again emigrated to Oregon. The trip was made across the plains with ox teams, and they were six months in making the trip, and suffered a great deal of toil and privation and some sickness and loss of property, stolen by Indians and left by the way. On the 11th of August, 1847, her husband, Asbel Merrill, died, and was buried in the graveyard at Fort Hall. In 1849 she returned to Illinois, via Panama and New Orleans, taking with her the two youngest children of the family. In 1851 she again crossed the plains to Oregon, bringing her two youngest children with her, and continued to be a resident of Oregon up to the time of her death. She was the mother of nine children. (Five boys and four girls), only four of whom survive her. (So far as is now known), viz: Mrs. Emerit Thorp, Mrs. Lydia Barnes, Mr. Lyman Merrill and George Merrill, all residents of Columbia county, Oregon. Deceased was a woman of great strength and endurance and always a hard worker, up to within a few years of her death. She walked hundreds of miles in both her trips across the plains in 1847 and 1851. She leaves four children, and a large number of grandchildren and great-grandchildren to mourn her loss. For several years the last part of her life she was obliged to quit work altogether on account of the loss of her eyesight—she was for several years totally blind—thus having to end her journey in darkness.
We mourn, but not without hope—
"It was sown in corruption, it shall be raised in glory."
