NORTHERN PACIFIC IMPROVEMENTS.—
The improvement work on the Northern Pacific roadbed has been begun for the season, and will be pushed until the close of the open season next fall. Steam abovels are at work at Jocko, on the Rocky mountain division, new rails are being laid between Spokane and Pasco, and bridges are being filled and ballasting done near Scappoose, on the stretch of line from Kalams to Portland. The work of improving the roadbed of the Northern Pacific is that which was started a year or two ago with the purpose of making the physical features of the line permanent. The proposition to lower the grade of the road near Green river, on the Pacific division, has not fully been decided on. NORTHERN PACIFIC IMPROVEMENTS.

SHIPWAY AT LIBRION.—There is at last to be a shipway at Portland, or in other words, a place provided where vessels are to be built and repaired, and the plant is to be first-class in every respect, the smelter property at Linnton having been purchased by an Eastern man for that purpose. It is said a plant capable of taking care of six large vessels at one time is to be put up at once at a cost of nearly \$200,000. This means employment for a great many mechanics, who, mostly, will make Linuton their home, and means fur that town more, per mostly, will make Linuon their home, and means for that town more, per haps, than is imagined. Not only will benefit accrue to the town of Linuon but the commerce of the Columbia river be benefitted by such an enterprise. It is hoped to have the plant completed in less than three months, and work has already heartn. and work has already begun.

DECEMAND DROWNED .- Henry Swan son, a deckhand on the steamer Lur-line, was drowned at Neer City, near Goble, on Friday morning of last week at 12:30 o'clock. The steamer was fast at the dock, and the crew was engaged in putting off a cylinder weigh-ing 800 pounds. In some manner, there was a slip, and the heavy cylin-der and this deckhand went overboard. iwanson rose to the surface once, and Swanson rose to the surface once, and then disappeared. Four minutes later the body was recovered with grappling hooks, and an hour was spent fruit-lessly in attempts at resuscitation. There were no marks indicating that Swanson had been struck by the cylinder. The body was turned over to the coroner of Columbia county, Dr. A. P. McLaren, who held an inquest Friday. Swanson was about 30 years old, and had no relatives in this country. He had been on the boat a week.

LARGE GUNS ARRIVE .- The first of the carriages for the battery of heavy rifled mortans, which is to form a part of the fortifications under erection at Fort Stevens, for the defense of the mouth of the Columbia, was trans-ferred from cars at Albina the other ferred from cars at Albina the other day to a barge for shipment to its destination. It is in many pieces, as, owing to its great weight, it would be practically impossible to handle it or transport it if set up. The base, or "racer," on which the huge mortar stands, weighs 14 tons. This is the heiviest piece. The base ring, which is furnished with cogs for changing the direction of the piece, weighs eight tons. There are a number of other heavy pieces, including a frame filled with great spiral springs, which are to "take" the recoil of the mortar when fired. There are scores of pieces of all chapes and sizes, the uses of which are known to only experts in gunnery, and chapes and sizes, the uses of which are known to only experts in guonery, and there are also two shot trucks, a sort of iron stand on wheels, with tops fitted for holding the huge rifled shells, which form the ammunition used by these mortars. The carriages for the remaining half dozen or more mortars which will form the battery are now strung along the railways on their way from the East, or awaiting shipment.




