The convention was called to order at 10:30 a. m. at Clatskanie by David Davis, chairman of the county central committee.

T. U. Watts was elected temporary chairman and David Davis temporary secretary.

Moved and carried that a committee of three be appointed by the chair on credentials.

Report of committee on order of business read and adopted as follows:

CLATSKANIE, Oregon, April 6th, 1898.

To the republican county convention of Columbia county Oregon.

Gentlemen:—We, your committee on order of business and permanent organization, beg to report the following for your consideration:

1. Permanent organization of this convention.

2. Nominations and election of one candidate for representative.

3. Nominations and election of one candidate for county clerk.

4. Nominations and election of one candidate for county sheriff.

5. Nominations and election of one candidate for county commissioner.

6. Nominations and election of one candidate for county school superintendent.

7. Nominations and election of one candidate for county treasurer.

8. Nominations and election of one candidate for county assessor.

9. Nominations and election of one candidate for county coroner.

10. Nominations and election of six delegates to attend the state republican convention to convene in Astoria on April 14.

11. Nominations and election of six delegates to attend the convention of the 2nd congressional district to convene at Astoria on April 15.

12. Nominations and election of one member of the state central committee from this county.

13. Selection county central committee.

14. Ratification of nominations.

15. Any other business which may properly come before the convention.

16. Adjournment.

We, your committee, would suggest or recommend that the temporary organization of this convention be made permanent, and that the temporary officers be confirmed in their respective positions.

We also recommend that the county central committee be composed of one member from each precinct.
