DR. WHITE TALKS.

He sounds a Note of Warning That Should Be Heeded by All.

One of the points where science teaches us that what is might have been avoided, is in the matter of irregular teeth. "A great percentage of the irregular teeth we see," says Dr. Thomas H. White, at the northeast corner of Morrison and Fourth streets, "is caused by the lack of proper care of the infant teeth. When we come to consider the great number of teeth in malposition, the subject of the care of the first teeth assumes new importance to us." In discussing this matter with a representative of the press, recently, he said among other things: "Mothers cannot be too careful in their consideration of the condition and character of the first teeth of their children. The object of this is not to allow the decay of the first teeth to proceed so far that they become ulcerated or abscess form at their roots, in which case extraction is the only solution of the trouble. The first teeth should be retained until nature is ready to supplant them with other teeth. This can be accomplished by the temporary filling of cavities so that the teeth may be depended upon in the mastication of food. The very exercise of the teeth, as with any other organ of the body, will aid in keeping them in a healthy condition. Every part of the body has a function to perform, and should be maintained in a healthy condition to accomplish it if possible. Every tooth, therefore, that is extracted interferes to a certain degree with the preparatory process of digestion. Of course, it is not to the interest of the dentist to have teeth taken care of too well."

KEY TO THE PACIFIC

Vast Increase in Trade Is Within Our Grasp.

WE MUST HAVE PHILIPPINES

Speech of Professor Gardiner Before Social Science Convention—St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 2.

At a session of the American Social Science Association, in Saratoga, N. Y., the principal address was delivered by Charles A. Gardiner, A. M., Ph. D., counsel for the elevated railroads of New York City. The subject of the address was "The Proposed Anglo-American Alliance."

Mr. Gardiner spoke of the tendency to national concentration in the present age, declaring that already three nations, Russia, Great Britain and America, comprising two races of people, the Slavic and Anglo-Saxon, practically dominate the world. He spoke of the continual aggression that has for more than eight centuries marked the policy of Russia and has spread her sovereignty over areas in Europe and Asia too vast almost for human conception. Against this aggression, he said, Great Britain has admitted that she can, unaided by some other great power, make no successful opposition. Attention at the present moment, he said, is directed to the Russo-British contest for supremacy in China. At this critical moment, he says, the possibility of an alliance with America, through consideration of her interests in the Philippines, is seemingly Great Britain's only hope of triumph. Said he:

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SHAFTER AT MONTAUK.

Commander of the Baiting Campaign Against an American Sloop.

New York, Sept. 2.—The transport City of Mexico, with General Shafter and staff, was sighted off Montauk Point at 6:40 A. M., and an hour later dropped anchor in Fort Pond bay.

General Shafter and his staff were landed shortly before 1 o'clock, being taken off in the auxiliary gunboat Alcan and landed at the floating dock, some distance away from the quarantine pier. General Young was at the pier at the time.

The coming ashore at the foot of the commander and his staff was unexpected. General Wheeler had the cavalry drawn up at the quarantine pier and the guns waiting to salute General Shafter. He was not aware that General Shafter was on shore until General Wheeler and his staff had been drawn to the detention hospital in carriages. General Wheeler was a little put out when he learned that General Shafter had landed.

General Shafter was in good health when he came ashore. On the City of Mexico besides the general and his staff came on company of the First regular infantry. No report as to their condition has been made.

General Wheeler, when informed that General Shafter was ashore, ordered the salute of 16 guns fired. It was difficult to get near General Shafter at the detention camp, but the commander of the Santiago campaign sent word to the correspondents that he was glad to be on American soil once more, but was sorry to learn that so many of his men had died and were still sick at Montauk. He said, however, that had the troops remained in Santiago they would have fared still worse.

Surgeon Meyer, who came north on the Allegheny, had something to say today as to the condition of the transport. It was on this vessel that 15 Ninth Massachusetts men died. Surgeon Meyer stated that when the Allegheny left Santiago there were but 13 sick men on board, but illness developed very quickly on the voyage, and when out a few days deaths occurred at the rate of three a day. The Massachusetts men and the First Illinois men were landed from the Allegheny today, and the 145 sick were sent to the hospital. The men from the City of Mexico were also taken ashore.

General Shafter is now, strictly speaking, by reason of rank, in command at Camp Wikoff, but he will not assume the reins of control until his term in the detention camp is finished. In an interview this afternoon, General Shafter said:

"I enjoyed the trip north on the City of Mexico greatly, but more so on account of the ship being a prize. From a casual observation, I like Camp Wikoff. It seems just such a place as I should have selected. I shall acquaint myself thoroughly with all the details of the camp."

"I know nothing of the Miles-Alger controversy until I was shown a paper on my arrival here. I will not discuss it, now that I am familiar with the phases of the case, nor will I enter the controversy at any time. Secretary Alger and General Miles can take care of themselves, and so can I."

"The Red Cross and other nurses did good work at Santiago, but the front is hardly the place for women. There was never any real scarcity of food in Cuba, but there was no transportation facilities to get supplies to the front other than pack trains."

"The army sick in the hospitals down there fared as well as possible in such a climate."

THREE BATTLE-SHIPS.

Bids for the New War Vessels Opened in Washington.

Washington, Sept. 2.—Four firms today offered bids for the three new battleships authorized by the last congress. The lowest bid of each for any type of one vessel follows:

Newport News Shipbuilding Co., \$2,580,000; Cramp's, Philadelphia, \$2,650; Union Iron Works, San Francisco, \$3,674,000; Dialogue & Co., Camden, \$2,840.

The result of the bidding is eminently satisfactory to the navy department. From the face of the bids it is clear that the government is going to secure much more in the matter of power and speed than was expected; that the cost is going to be less than was paid proportionately for the Illinois class, and, finally, that the department will be able to distribute the work among the three big building concerns, a method of construction that always redounds to the advantage of the government.

The Newport News Company is the lowest bidder, but bids for only one ship. The highest is the Union Iron works, but the act of congress makes an allowance of not to exceed 4 per cent in favor of the Pacific bidders, so that brings their bid within line. The Cramps come in between them, and consequently the three ships are likely to be distributed geographically in that order. In the case of the 18-knot ships, both the Cramps and the Union Iron works submitted similar plans. The Newport News bid for the 18-knot vessel is original with them. If it should not be satisfactory to the department, then the Cramps would probably get two ships.

The bids have been taken under advisement by Acting Secretary Allen.

The bids were made in three classes, the first being under the plans prepared by the navy department calling for ships of about 11,500 tons with a speed of 16 knots. Other classes were under plans prepared by the builders themselves, and in some cases additional plans were prepared by the engineering bureau, but included in the original specifications sent out to bidders.

Pacific Cable Plans.

New York, Sept. 2.—At a meeting of the directors of the Pacific Cable Company, held at the office of J. P. Morgan & Co., plans were considered for establishing cable connection with the Philippines, the Asiatic coast, Japan and Australia, via Hawaii. Surveys for a duplicate cable, via Sitka and the Aleutian islands, were ordered. James A. Sorymer, president of the Pacific Cable Company, will sail from Vancouver for Japan on September 13.
