Tuesday was a busy day in St. Helens. The streets were crowded with jurors, witnesses, lawyers, and spectators, but the small amount of business in the circuit court, and the discharge of the jury, soon caused the crowds to disperse.

Mr. J. L. Jones, justice of the peace for Rainier precinct, and chancellor commander of Rainier lodge Knights of Pythias, died at Rainier Tuesday forenoon at 11:45. Mr. Jones was well known in and around Rainier, where he had many warm friends, being genial and accommodating. Deceased was also a member of the Masonic order.

Complaint has been received at this office that our bundle of papers does not arrive at Mist and other Lower Nehalem places until Tuesday of each week. 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CIRCUIT COURT.

Little Business to Do—Jury Excused for the Term.

The regular October term of the circuit court for Columbia county was convened at 9:30 Tuesday forenoon by Judge McBride. W. A. Harris, clerk, J. N. Rice, sheriff, T. J. Clemon, prosecuting attorney, T. C. Wats and J. K. Blakesley attorneys.

The rollcall of jurors was proceeded with, and the entire panel answered "present."

The drawing of a grand jury was then proceeded with, and resulted in John Redick, Arnold Graham, Silvio Graham, J. P. Wells, A. S. Lyons, Martin Harvey, and John Edholm being drawn, the first-named, John Redick, appointed foreman.

All other jurors except James Muckie, Jr., E. M. Wharton, and Claudius Mesker, were discharged for the term, and those three until next Monday.

Little business is expected this term, in fact no cases of any consequence are expected for trial. The grand jury is expected to have little to occupy its attention.

The present term will probably cost less to the county than any term for a number of years back.

Grand Jury Report.

In the circuit court of the state of Oregon for Columbia county.

POISONED AND DIED.

Death of Three Prominent Citizens of this County.

A Light Lunch on Canned Goods Proves a Fatal Meal—All Members of Rainier Lodge K. of P.

The people of Rainier and the surrounding neighborhood were greatly excited this week over the sudden death of two prominent men, Mr. J. L. Jones, of Rainier, and Mr. F. J. Young, who resided near Aplyria.

Mr. Walter Furrow, of Rainier, lies in the Portland hospital at the point of death with apparently the same ailment that affected the two who are dead.

The three gentlemen were members of the Order of Knights of Pythias, and had attended lodge at Rainier last Saturday evening. Just before lodge they went to the saloon of Miles Sheerin, after buying a can each of lobsters, clams, and shrimps at W. J. Deitz's store, and proceeded to eat them along with crackers and an occasional drink.

After lodge it is supposed they went to the drug store of Mr. Jones, where they ate more lunch, a plate and knife and fork having been found there.

Mr. Jones took violently sick on Monday night and at 11:45 on Tuesday died. No particular notice, further than his sudden and mysterious death, was taken of the matter until later in the day Tuesday when Walter Furrow was hauled into town on a sled, suffering from an ailment exactly similar to that which affected Mr. Jones.

Upon the arrival of Mr. Furrow, a little little examination revealed the fact that Mr. Young had been with the other gentlemen on Saturday evening, and he, too, might be in the same critical condition, hence messengers were immediately dispatched to his home near Aplyria, where he was found dead in his bed.

Indications pointed to the fact that Mr. Young had struggled considerably between life and death, and had been very sick at his stomach. His clothes had been changed and it is supposed that he died either Sunday or Monday. A lamp was found still burning in his room. He was a bachelor and for that reason it is impossible to ascertain the exact facts in the case.

The members of Rainier lodge who accompanied Mr. Furrow to Portland returned to Rainier Wednesday morning to attend the funeral of Mr. Jones, and reported the condition of the sick man even worse than when he arrived at the hospital, and no hope whatever was entertained for his recovery.

LATER.—Mr. Walter Furrow died in the hospital at Portland at 9 o'clock Thursday morning.

Mr. Young was buried at Rainier Thursday by the Knights of Pythias of Rainier and Aylon lodges.

Mr. Furrow will be buried at Rainier today.

Dr. Cliff and Dr. Ross were in Portland attending the grand lodge Knights of Pythias, and they were summoned to Rainier, accompanied by Dr. Oasthorn. A jury was empaneled, witnesses were examined and a verdict of death by ptomaine poisoning rendered in accordance with the medical opinions.

Ptomaine poisoning is a result of an alkaloid formation from animal or vegetable putrefaction, sometimes engendered in canned goods.

ON A TOUR OF INSPECTION.

The county commissioners, Messrs. Frakes and Peckrose, were out last week on an inspection of roads and bridges throughout the county.

Mr. Frakes traveled by horseback from Rainier through Beavercreek valley to Clatskanie, thence to Mist and Fishhawk, where he was joined by Mr. Peckrose. The bridges in that locality were inspected, and the journey returned over one Crooked creek. The trip up Nehalem river was then made to the Taylor bridge, above Vernonia, from whence Mr. Frakes continued on over the mountain to this city. Mr. Frakes states that the last mentioned bridge needs some repairs, but otherwise the bridges in the county are in fairly good condition.
