Thus the war with Spain has cost \$167,529,941, or a fraction over \$1,000.000 per day since the beginning of heatilities, April 21, against the enormous sum of \$3,065,413,415 during the civil war, or an average of \$1,685,156 per day. The largest amount paid out in a single day during the war with Spain was \$4,110,000, or nearly enough to construct and squip a first class battle-ship. The next highest days were September 19, when \$3,775.000 was spent, and July 19, with a total of \$3,770,000, but the daily expenses frequently ran above the \$3,000.000 mark.
