Mr. John Dolan, of Warren, left with us this week a four-column article taken from the Ohio State Journal, published at Columbus, written by his nephew, Lieutenant W. H. Mulvey, who, with his brother, Lieutenants P. H. Mulvey, were brave leaders in the recent war with Spain, one at Cuba, the other at Manila. The two lieutenants are nephews of Mr. Dolan's, and the account written by the soldier is an interesting one to read.

A letter from Mr. John Fringle, of Vernonia, secretary of the read subscription committee of the Nehalem valley, says at the meeting held last Saturday at Vernonia, over \$400 in labor was reported subscribed, to be applied on the road from Vernonia to St. Helens. A committee was appointed, to meet on December 2nd, to look over the road and locate any changes that might be thought beneficial. Mr. Fringle states that a report is current that the work is to be put on another road, and he wishes it understood that this road from Vernonia to St. Helens is to receive all the work.

Mr. W. B. Dillard brought into this office one day this week an Irish potato, which illustrated what peculiar pranks nature would sometimes play. The potato had been dumped on the cellar floor in a dry, spungy, apparently lifeless condition, and through some peculiar process of nature's dealing it made the best of the situation and began the work of regeneration with good results, as the potato was literally full of miniature "spuds," not attached to the potato from which it sprouted, but were in the body of it, near the surface. At nearly every eye there was growing a little potato, backwards, however, into the body.

An order made in the county court at its last session, empowering and directing the sheriff to execute deeds to Columbia county for all lands heretofore bid in by the county at tax sales, and not subject to redemption, is one of considerable importance. It is possible now for persons to select a desirable piece of land owned by the county and make application to the clerk for its purchase by depositing the cash, and at the next regular sitting of the court the property will be ordered transferred. By this order the county now owns all lands purchased by it two years ago, and previous to that time, and is willing to dispose of the same for the amount of its claim against it.

A bowling contest now on between teams composed of local bowlers in this city seems to be the center of attraction with the "sporting" element. A tournament of twenty-one games is to be played, three games each night, two nights in the week. Dr. Cliff, G. G. Mayger, James Rice, J. G. Watts, E. E. Quick and Thomas Muckle, with James Sheldon, as captain, are pitted against Andrew King, David G. Martin, White, W. A. Harris, G. A. Hall and C. H. Johns, with Marion Gray, as captain, and interest is at fever heat. Nine games have so far been bowled with the two teams "neck-and-neck" in the race. Friend Gable is proving himself a genial and impartial coacher, carefully guarding the prerogatives of each individual. The outcome is very uncertain. Each team is averaging 600 points each evening.

The large jam of logs which has been in Milton creek, near the Scappoose-St. Helens road, for several months, was successfully broken and the greater number of the logs are now afloat in Scappoose bay. The jam contained several million feet of choice fir logs which it was absolutely impossible to move without an immense head of water at the large dam, which resulted from the recent heavy rains. While this jam and other logs of logs "hung up" in the creek have been an unfortunate thing for their owners, it has also been an obstruction to the progress of operations of the Oregon Wood Company, who depend to a considerable extent upon an open creek to operate their flume. Over a thousand cords of wood were awaiting this opportunity for unobstructed passage down the creek. The good results from this half day's work can hardly be estimated. The logs represent the labor of nearly every man living along Milton creek, as that industry is chief in that vicinity, and no logs had been run out of the creek for nearly two years. James Muckle says the jam contained about \$12,000 worth of logs. The big run was made on Tuesday, and the loggers are happy.

Martin Costigan, Irish extraction, says he is a tinner by trade, and who claims to hail from Colorado, and is a tramp by present occupation, is now in the clutches of the law, charged with assault with the intent to commit rape upon Sarah, the 12-year-old daughter of Mr. John Gilmore, who resides just west of this city about a half a mile. Little Miss Gilmore, as is her custom, on Tuesday morning started for school, and the tramp who designed her ruin, followed her from the railroad track, towards town for about a quarter of a mile, and slipping by a by-path, he headed her off, seized the child and attempted to drag her into the bush, and only for the wonderful presence of mind displayed by Sarah in throwing her shoulders backward and slipping out of her mackintosh, at the same time running and screaming for Mr. Plank, who is the child near the scene, the ruin of the child would have been accomplished and her life probably taken. The feud becoming alarmed, skulked into the bush again and made his way hastily toward Deer Island. Sarah made her way to the home of Mr. Plank, where she related her story, and that gentleman accompanied her to her father's home, where the story was related, and the two gentlemen, taking their rifles as warrants of arrest, returned to the scene, and found him tracks of the man, followed him to Deer Island station, where he was overhauled and marched back to Justice. When arraigned before Justice, she pleaded not guilty, but at his examination in the sum of \$500 bail. There are many persons here, however, who believe the wrong man is being punished for the offense.

COURT PROCEEDINGS.

Business Transacted at the Regular November Sitting.

In addition to the proceedings of the county court published in this paper two weeks ago, the following is a report of the deliberations of that body in regular session at the November term:

Tax sale certificate No. 497, covering 640 acres of land sold for 1895 taxes, assessed to W. A. Edgerston, ordered turned over to the sheriff and the land by him deeded to Columbia county.

The northeast 1/4 of section 6, township 6 north, range 3 west, sold to Columbia county for 1895 taxes, ordered transferred to Richard Eversing for the sum of \$45.10.

The petition of the Astoria railroad company asking that certain alterations in the county roads adjacent to their track be received and legalized, was amended and by the court accepted.

Mrs. E. M. Watis was granted a rebate of tax to the amount of \$10.90, on the 1891 roll, on land not proved up on.

Upon petition of a number of persons residing in the vicinity, asking an appropriation of county funds to be expended on the Clatskanie and Mist road, the court ordered \$65 appropriated, to be expended under direction of Commissioner Peterson.

Numerously signed petitions praying for a bounty on wild animals was presented to the court, and after due consideration the following scale of bounties was allowed on animals killed after November 15, 1898, to-wit: On cougar, \$4.00; on bear, \$2.00; on wildcat, \$1.00; on gray ground squirrels, 2 cents.

Tax sale certificate No. 419, covering land assessed to W. H. Wood, and sold for tax, ordered assigned to G. G. Ames, trustee for Rona Ames, upon the payment of the delinquent taxes, amounting to \$54.83.

Costs and penalty amounting to \$27.20, on lot 9, block 11, in Georgetown, ordered retained upon payment of 22 cents, the original tax.

Filing the tax levy for 1898 was ordered postponed until the January term.

County warrant No. 493, for \$25.00, drawn in favor of S. Z. Joy, for damages on Joy road, ordered cancelled.

Upon payment of \$600 delinquent taxes, the costs and penalty of sale of the lands of L. Saldern were ordered remitted.

Tax sale certificate No. 311, covering lot 2, in block 2, in Bryantville, ordered assigned to Lizzie L. Rice on payment of \$17.70.

The accounts and books of the clerk, sheriff and treasurer were checked up and approved.

Thomas H. Woodruff was appointed justice of the peace for Rainier precinct.

The claim of the News Publishing Company for publishing the delinquent tax rolls was allowed in the sum of \$484, and the sheriff ordered to turn over \$108.45 cash collected, and the clerk to draw a warrant for \$375.55 to cover balance of said claim.

It is ordered that the sheriff execute deeds to the county for any lands sold for taxes, and not subject to redemption, upon presentation of tax sale certificates.
