THE THISTLE LAW.

A law passed at the recent session of the legislature provides that it shall be the duty of each road supervisor of each district in the state to ascertain from time to time and know whether or not there is in his district any weed known as the "Russian thistle," the "Canada thistle," or the "Chinese thistle," and he shall as he ascertains that there is any of such weeds, and before any thereof has shed its bloom or commenced to form the seed, notify the county judge, in writing, of the existence of such weed, and in a similar manner notify the owner or occupant of the premises upon which said weeds or thistles may be.

If, after such notice, the owner shall fail or refuse to destroy such weeds, it shall be the duty of the road supervisor to call such help as he may deem necessary and go upon said land and cause said weed to be extirpated in such a manner as to prevent the spreading of the seed from the same.

If said charges and expenses are not paid by the owner within six months after the same is docketed, the district attorney shall bring suit in the name of the county for the foreclosure of said lien; and the lands affected shall be sold under execution for the payment and satisfaction of said expenses and charges, and of said lien and all charges touching the same.

It shall be the duty of each road supervisor in each road district in the state to call a sufficient number of laborers to cut down and destroy, before the same has dropped its bloom or commenced to form its seed, any Russian thistle, Canada thistle or Chinese thistle found growing at any time hereafter in the public highways or upon any public lands in his road district, and the county court shall admit and allow the amount of charges and just and reasonable charges of such work, as other claims or bills filed by the road supervisors.

It shall be the duty of all municipal corporations in this state to provide for the extermination of said Russian thistle, Canada thistle or Chinese thistle, within the limits of such corporation, or upon the vacant lands within said corporation; and any city or town incorporated within this state neglecting or refusing to comply with the provisions of this act, shall be liable to a forfeiture to the county in which said municipal corporation is situated of a sum not less than \$50 nor more than \$500, to be recovered against such municipal corporation in a suit maintained by the county in which said municipal corporation is situated.

TIMBER GETTING SCARCE.

What an Eastern Millman Says of Oregon Forests. The timber supply of Oregon may last twenty-five years yet, at the present rate of consumption, according to W. P. Bartlett, of Eau Claire, Wis., who arrived in the city yesterday, and is at the Portland, says the Friday Oregonian. Mr. Bartlett, is vice-president of the Grande Ronde Lumbering Company, of La Grande, and owns 100,000,000 feet of standing timber in Coos county, which he does not care to touch for several years to come, as timber is yearly becoming more valuable, while the demand is increasing just as steadily in the markets of the world.

ORDERS OF COUNTY COURT.

Proceedings in Detail Had at the July Term. Be it remembered that at a regular term of the county court of the state of Oregon, for the county of Columbia, begun and held in the county court house, in the city of St. Helens, in said county, on Wednesday, the 25th day of July, 1899, and the time fixed by law for holding a regular term of said court, when present the Hon. J. B. Doan, judge; Hon. P. A. Frakes, commissioner; Hon. N. D. Peterson, commissioner; J. G. Watts, clerk; J. N. Rice, sheriff. Due proclamation being made, the following proceedings were had: Petition of Jacob Skusa and others for change in Adams road, in section 10, township 3 north, range 2 west, read, and J. P. West, M. J. Engler and S. Adams were appointed viewers and Geo. Hayes, surveyor, to meet at Skusa's July 12th, 1899, to view out and survey said road.

REVOLT AGAINST BRYAN.

Democratic Party Hard Up for a Campaign Issue. New York, July 17.—George W. Keeney, president of the Associated of Silver Clubs, said last night to a New York Times reporter: "I do not think that free silver coinage will be made the principal issue in the platform the democrats will adopt next year. If Mr. Bryan obtains control of the convention he will, of course, see that silver has an important place in the platform, but no man or faction can, I believe, force that issue back into the prominence it had in 1896. The party fears it would have no chance of winning on that old issue. Besides there is a clamor for new issues and a fight along new lines. "I do not believe that anti-imperialism will be made the chief or even a conspicuous feature. The best men in the democratic party either approve the policy of the administration or feel that the present course has been inevitable and must be fought through to success. It will not do for Bryan to put himself against the brains and patriotism of the country. Many of his friends have felt that he is only losing ground by his present policy of attacking the administration's blunders that so much fighting and slaughter has been necessary and by showing that our soldiers were actually starved in the field. Anti-expansion won't do. We succeeded last year in electing one democrat in California merely because he favored the annexation of Hawaii. "Again, the trusts are not to be played very hard as a political card. They are also confused by the action of such capitalists as Havermeyer and Huntington, and there is a feeling at last that the trusts have a pretty good stake in the democratic party."
