Consular Report for July: During the latest year, 1898-9, England bought from the American farmers \$56,367,397 worth of wheat, and \$41,325,609 worth of flour, during the same period other countries in Europe purchased \$40,099,876 of wheat and \$6,426,210 in flour. In wheat and flour there was sold to Europe \$143,133,092 of which the larger portion was bought by England.
