Mr. U. M. Beeghly, of Vernonia, came over to this place Tuesday and continued on to Portland. Mr. Beeghly reports the wheat crop in the Nehalem valley an almost total failure owing to the presence of the Hessian fly.

Mr. John Pringle, of Vernonia, was in town a day or two the first of the week. Mr. Pringle says he is still negotiating with Eastern capitalists for the sale of a very large tract of timber land in Nehalem valley.

Representative Merrill was in the County Seat Monday. Mr. Merrill reports a lively campaign of business affairs in the vicinity of Clatskanie, especially in those a great amount of teasing being done there at present.

Dr. Cliff will leave Portland next Wednesday for his European trip. He will sail from New York on the 22nd on board the steamer St. Louis. While absent he will visit his former home in England, take in the Paris Exposition and other points and places of interest and return home about the middle of October.

Owing to the indiscriminate use of through Portland and Astoria reduced rate tickets by parties living at intermediate stations along the line, the C. & C. R. R. Co. will make no sale at Portland or Astoria on August 8th, tickets to the points affected by the cheap rate, which will prohibit their use from any other station than the initial point named on the ticket, and conductors will have strict orders to honor the tickets only from the points at which they are sold. If a man wants to make a trip from Clatskanie or some other way station now, he will have to buy his ticket in the proper manner instead of asking some accommodating friend to bring it to him from Portland.

There seems to be a temporary lull in timber land deals for the past few days, says the Oregonian, but those interested look for increased activity in a short time. A drought in the grain-growing districts of the East has put a damper on the demand for lumber, and the timber speculators of Wisconsin, Michigan and Minnesota are not so keen to buy timber land as they were. One man came out here from Duluth a week ago to purchase 20,000 acres of timber land in a body, but he received a telegram ordering him back about the time he had finished looking up the land. The deal would have amounted to \$250,000, and the railroad into the belt would have cost \$50,000 more. The agent here, however, has hope of consummating the trade later.

Marques Zimmerdale got his leg badly crushed under the sled which was hauling the donkey engine at Brigg's camp last week. He was taken to the hospital at Portland and at last accounts it was not clear whether the limb could be saved or not.

A. E. Thomas was out from the mill above Mist the first of the week, looking after lumber interests. He reports 17 teams at work hauling between the mill and Clatskanie, and has about one-third of his mill production already on this side of the mountain.

Mrs. Rosenberg came down from Portland Friday evening for a trip to Vesper. She will pass her cottage some three miles out of town where she spent some years securing land on a homestead filing. The cottage is one of the landmarks on the way to Mist.

**Rainier Electric Light Co.**  
SALAS, Aug. 6. Articles of Incorporation were filed in the Secretary of State's office today by the Rainier Electric and Light Company, the intention being to utilize the waters of Fox Creek, in Columbia County, as a power for fluming wood, lumber and timbers, also as a source of domestic supply. Another object is to establish an electric light and power plant at Rainier, where the principal office is to be. The capital stock is \$3000, the incorporators being Dean Blanchard, S. Benson, J. Silver, and W. L. Stacy.

**Our Bicycle Path.**  
It is very evident that so far as the cash will go it will be expended to excellent advantage in constructing bicycle paths. Mr. C. E. Whitney, in whose hands the bicycle money was placed for expenditure in this part of the County, is making judicious disposition of it, and what work is accomplished will be of a first-class character and permanent in nature. Just about one mile of path will be completed, the entire distance being graded and covered with crushed brick, then rolled and packed. From St. Helens to the Milton bridge cyclists can now depend on good going, over which distance has heretofore been the most difficult and tiresome wheeling. The one mile of path cost \$50, but the work could be extended at much less cost per mile. A general effort, which would have the co-operation of the Scappoose and Warren cyclists, should be put forth to extend the improvement to the County line. The improvement would be of mutual benefit to business men and riders, and would do much for the promotion of the bicycle industry. The effort should co-operate with the effort to open the way for cyclists from Portland to wheel to our city.

The total amount of city warrants remaining unpaid, issued prior to the inauguration of the present council, amounts to but \$98. Of course the present council has incurred considerable expense, but no one is complaining; the indebtedness created was for street improvement, which was a judicious expenditure of the city's funds.

That this season of the year the mountains are full of campers and it is necessary that care should be exercised to prevent the spread of forest fires. A little carelessness may result in destruction of much valuable timber and possibly in the loss of life. People should bear in mind that there are strict laws regulating the setting of fire, and providing penalties for all who cause their setting and fail to extinguish them. It is a small matter to see that the fire is put out, when breaking camp.

That Kansas populists like Jerry Simpson and thrust him into our darkness? They are no prosperous for him, or rather for his reputation. They want men who both wear stocks and have a reputation for wearing them. Jerry is prosperous, too, and wears the most expensive kind of socks of late. But the reputation of his candidacy days clings round him still, and the Kansas populists want to be represented by men and women who have the air of blue-blooded patricians or plutocrats, since they have put the days of their poverty behind them, and since their banks are lending money to the poor railroads and bankers of the East.

That it is high time that there was some work done on the Clatskanie river? Says the Chief. Perhaps someone is holding back, thinking they will get a bonus to push the business through. It has been about six years since a petition was sent to congress and nearly two years since an appropriation of \$13,000 was made for this improvement and still the river is as crooked as ever. There should be something done about the matter. Clatskanie might organize a chamber of commerce, push club or some kind of an organization that will look after the interests of the county. You will never get any improvements unless you do something of the kind. Other towns do so, why not Clatskanie?

That the old saying that it is no disgrace to be poor is all right? but we would add that it is mighty handy to be rich those days when the roads to the mountains and springs are open and all one needs to get to the top of the mountain to provide a little "grub" for the trip and some one to look after the business at home while you are away. The poor devil of a printer is just the sort of an individual who is compelled to forego the pleasures of such a trip, and stay at home and cut his paper, even if everybody else is out of town. When it comes to summer outings and vacations the printer is not in it, but he has the satisfaction of knowing that he will receive his reward hereafter.

That there has been more farm machinery shipped to Clatskanie this season remarks the Clatskanie Chief, than in any three years since that paper was started, and we are of the opinion that our citizens should wake up and do something? Every town in the United States is not sleeping, but is rustling to improve the opportunities offered them. Clatskanie has quite a number offered her, then why not take advantage and rustle for something? Our time is passing so fast that we are going to make our citizens begin to figure on some other way to keep up their income and we can think of no better way than to establish a flouring mill in our midst. The Chief has tried before to impress the people of this necessity, but they listened not.

**To Use Northern Trackage.**  
The Globe, Nehalem & Pacific Railway Company, which is constructing a logging road from Nehalem to the Nehalem, is at work. A 2000-foot bridge is being constructed. President Cannon is now en route east to look after the rolling stock necessary. The road will be laid with 60-pound rails, and timber will be stacked in three piles. The road will be tamped and graded, and it is the purpose of the company to make cordwood of all the timber not used for sawlogs. A switch from the Northern Pacific's track will allow cars to be loaded with poles, wood, etc., and shipped direct to Portland and other points.

## STATE SCHOOL FUND.

Largest Sum Ever Available in the State for School Purposes.

The Irreducible State school fund for 1900 has been appropriated by the State Treasurer, the total amount being \$207,467.34, the largest sum ever available for school purposes in the history of this State. The rate per capita is also 11 cents greater than at any time. The total number of school children in the State is 128,181, and the per capita is \$1.66. This year Columbia County draws \$3,452.25, having 22,213 children. Last Friday County Treasurer Ross received from the State Treasurer a check for the amount of school money due this County, but owing to law the cash cannot be apportioned among the several districts until the first Monday in October. Multnomah County received the largest amount of any County in the State, the sum being, \$38,823.72, showing 24,857 children, while Curry County drew \$183.92, having but 83 children.

Following is a comparative table of the number of children, the per capita and the amount of funds apportioned in the State during the last ten years, a perceptible gain being shown:
