A snow storm, lasting half an hour, prevailed at Mayger Tuesday evening. Atmospheric conditions here, too, have been bordering closely on the snow order all week. It's up to some one to predict a severe winter.

The residence and workshop of Mr. Seward Hasmussen, of Hildesheim Falls, son-in-law of Mr. John Gilmore, of this city, was totally destroyed by fire last Thursday. The loss was \$6000, partly covered by insurance of \$3000.

J. A. Reed, dentist, once a resident of this city, was arrested last Thursday at Dayton, Yamhill County, for practicing his profession without a license, in violation of a State law. Reed was arrested once in Portland for a similar offense.

Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Matthews, of Portland, spent a week in this city visiting and attending to business matters. Mr. Matthews is a representative of the Wiley B. Allen musical instrument establishment, and while here placed two pianos.

Through the efforts of Mr. N. A. Perry, the local agent, the Northern Pacific Railroad Company has made a \$1 per ton rate from Portland to Houston on flour, feed and heavy goods. This is about 50 cents per ton less than the former rate.

The matter of road survey No. 99, known as the Ridgway road, northeast of Vernonia, over which there has been so much discussion as to its legal location, has finally been settled by the County Surveyor, who states "that upon examination of the field notes the road was laid on the township line."

The Government makes appropriations for Government buildings, hospitals, etc., at the mouth of the Columbia, and the bids are opened to find that they exceed the appropriation. It costs more to build on the Pacific Coast than on the Atlantic, for the reason that material and labor are higher.

The September number of The Senator, a Pythian journal, contains a portrait of Brother M. R. Pomeroy, of Rainier, characterizing him the youngest Past Chancellor in this domain. We presume the statement to be correct, and will add that "Met," notwithstanding his age, was a notable good Commander.

H. H. Clark, a dairyman at Warren, who was in the city yesterday, says Friday's Oregonian has published the milk band question by hiring little Japs, and showing them how to pull the cows. "These little fellows," he said, "never give me any trouble; they strike and never throw up the job. With white bands a dairyman is kept in hot water all the time expecting a demand for higher wages or that the men desire to change places. I have paid men \$35 and board in order to keep them, but next month, 'well, I believe I'll go to the sound,' or 'I guess I'd rather work nearer to town,' or something of the sort would turn up and so I have to come to Portland and look for new hands all the time. I am getting over those little annoyances now."

The excellence of mechanism and haste and economy displayed by Commissioner Case in repairing, or rather rebuilding the two Nehalem bridges, was satisfactory to the other members of the County Court, that had been instructed by Mr. Case to proceed forthwith to replace the bridge across Nehalem just above Vernonia. The cost of rebuilding the three bridges will be nearly one-half less than the original cost of the structures, and the County is extremely fortunate in being able to rebuild them at the extremely low figure, besides the money so expended is retained by home people, better far than to pay the money to outsiders, who naturally would carry it away with them.

Inquiries are made daily from voters who are under the impression that they can change their registration, that is, transfer it from one place to another. This cannot be done, as the registration books were closed on May 10th for two years, and the Clerk has no authority to make any changes therein. The only time it was possible to make any changes was before the books were closed. A voter who is registered here and wishes to vote at some other place will have to obtain six freeholders to help swear in his vote. These voters can save time and trouble by preparing their blanks before election day.

The official ballot for the November election is in the hands of the printer and is being turned out as rapidly as our facilities will permit. The ballot contains five groups of names, Republican, Democratic, Regular Peoples, Prohibition and Social Democratic. To the right of the groups of electors representing each of the several parties, appear the names of the candidates for President. The ballot is the essence of simplicity, and the candidates are invited for President to meet the demands of all classes and kinds—good, bad and indifferent.

Mr. Ralph Dunway, who spoke at Warren last Friday evening in behalf of Republican principles, is said to have presented his case in a clean, clear, precise manner to a good-sized audience, which appreciated his remarks and characterized them as able and convincing. Mr. Dunway was to have spoken in Vernonia last Saturday evening, but his friends had not the heart to start him out on such a trip when the prevailing elements were in such a condition.

A SENTENCE OF FIVE YEARS

Imposed on Manley Lane, for Attempt to Rape.

\$5,000 Verdict in a Damage Suit—One Criminal Case Held Over—Other Court Matters.

Manley Lane is now an inmate of the Oregon penitentiary, there to remain five years, as decreed by Judge McBride, who denied the motion for a new trial, and sentenced the prisoner Monday forenoon. Lane had been in jail almost a year, pending the outcome of his trial, and his sentence of five years makes the penalty for his acts severe enough to serve as a substantial warning to mankind not to take undue liberties. This trial has been a weary, expansive affair, not calculated in the least to reflect credit upon the County nor the community in which the crime was committed. The sooner the affair can be forgotten the better it will be for all concerned. Lane is a young man, and upon his return to the community will be wiser and convinced that "the wages of sin is death." He was taken to Salem Tuesday night.

A \$5000 VERDICT.

Outcome of Damage Suit Against Star Logging Company. The damage suit of Curtis Bowers against the Star Logging Company for \$50,000, brought to recover for the loss of an arm while in the defendant's employ, and which occupied three days of the County's attention last week, resulted in a verdict for the plaintiff of \$5000. The case was a hard legal contest throughout, and upon the rendering of the verdict by the jury counsel for the defense asked for the privilege of filing a motion for a new trial. The Court allowed twenty days in which to file the motion. T. J. Cleaton and St. Rayner & Clark were counsel for the plaintiff. Attorney Minor, of Portland, and Messrs. Dillard & Day, of this city, appeared for the defendant.

Taken Under Adversement.

The attention of the Court was occupied Monday in hearing the case of the State against John B. Ferrell for assault and battery on the person of Ah Wing, a Chinaman. The jury returned a verdict of guilty as charged in the complaint. The evidence showed the case to be very strong in which the jury certainly believed to be so, since its verdict was returned after short deliberation. The penalty for the offense is a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$500 and imprisonment in the County jail for one year. Sentence was suspended, however, awaiting the introduction of further testimony, probably as a leniency of the Court. Sentence will be pronounced today.

Peter Stewart in Custody.

An indictment was returned in to Court Monday upon a transcript issued from the Justice Court of Union Precinct against Peter Stewart, for criminal intimacy with the seven-year-old daughter of R. S. Lillach. The case will be heard December 1st. The bond of \$5000, which was up to press hour had not been furnished.

The Court discharged the jury at 3 o'clock Monday afternoon, retaining A. N. Clark, of Houston, and C. G. Caples, of Columbia City, for the adjourned session in December.

Court will adjourn Saturday until the 1st day of December.

Special Session Held Last Saturday Pursuant to Adjournment.

Court came pursuant to adjournment. All officers present. Due proclamation being made the following proceedings were had:

Petition of W. M. Wilson for rebate of poll tax, allowed in the sum of \$3.

In the matter of the assignment of tax and certificates Nos. 135, 375, 1136, 534 and 1144, assigned to E. Cannon for \$266.84, not including current tax of \$24.64, paid by the purchaser of the tax titles.

Tax sale certificate No. 519 was assigned to W. P. McClay for \$62.85.

F. E. Sanford presented a claim for the cancellation of tax sale certificate No. 861. No title being vested in Sanford, the petition was allowed.

(This special session of Court was called for the purpose of settling with the Sheriff for the current delinquent tax roll, but by reason of an extraordinary amount of business to attend to that official was not ready to settle.)

As soon as the election is over, Mr. Bryan will be given a job as weather forecaster at Astoria. His prognostications are so unreliable that it is presumed that he would make a good weather prophet. As he will be out of a job after the 6th of November and the silver mine owners will put up no more money for him, he will have to be taken care of. One objection to his coming to Astoria is that if the County Court finds it out they may allow him \$10 a month. Mr. Bryan, it will be remembered, made predictions four years ago that have never materialized, hence would make a good weather forecaster.—Astoria Herald.

MIRACULOUS ESCAPE.

At Robinson Falls Forty-Five Feet Over a Perpendicular Bluff.

Wonder is that Allan Robinson, well known in this part of the County, does not lie in his grave instead of in his bed, resting comparatively easy. His escape from instant death is a miracle, and his revival from the reactionary shock adds to the marvel that he is still alive. Last Thursday night, about 12 o'clock, he was returning from Columbia City, having arrived at the Sister's place, just below this city, where his path took him close to the edge of the bluff. The night was intensely dark, and he, unawares of the dangerous proximity to the bluff, ventured too close, falling a distance of forty-five feet down the perpendicular rocky precipice, striking foot foremost, the weight of his body crushing his knees to the rocks, thence his head, and the rebound threw him up and backward on his back.

Still conscious, he remained in that position for some time, that the rain striking in his face would refresh him. Realizing the uselessness of shouting in that out-of-the-way place, and having no use of his lower limbs, he determined to make an effort to reach his home, but a few hundred yards away. In this he succeeded in crawling several hundred feet by reaching forward with his hand and dragging his body over the rocks. His progress was interrupted, however, by a log lying horizontally across the beach. By chance he was espied by passengers on the America the next morning, who, upon arrival here, informed Dr. Ross and Kendall Blakeley, who hastened to the then unknown person's assistance. He was carried to his home, where for three days he suffered intense pain, but is now resting easier. No bones were broken.

Died of Paralysis.

John Carrol, a man who had been staying at the home of H. H. Clark, of Warren, died of paralysis Monday night. Carrol had been in a Portland hospital for some time, discharged and went to Clark's place, where he remained about two weeks. He had revisited Portland for a few days, returning to Warren Saturday evening.
